# RC Attempting To List Nurses

An attempt to bring the list of nurses available for a local emergency up to date is being made by the Lane County Red Cross chapter, in charge of recruiting nurses should a disaster or epidemic arise. The chapter is the recruiting agent for nurses for any disaster, and would like to have a list of all nurses in Lane County who might be available to assist with disaster or epidemic work. Nurses experienced in packing polio patients, interested in training in this work, or who can give even short term service should the need arise are asked to register. All details as to hours and salary for this type of work are arranged with the hospitals in time of emergency, the Red Cross office said. Purpose of the registration is only to have a complete list as possible of available nurses. Nurses may go to the Red Cross office for more details, or may call. Nurses may also register at the Red Cross if they are available for out-of-town duty in emergencies in other parts of the state or country.
