

Lewis, UMW Appeal Fines

WASHINGTON — (AP) — John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers have appealed to the Supreme Court to set aside their contempt of court convictions and fines of \$1,420,000 for failing to end the coal strike in March, 1948.

Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough had fined Lewis \$20,000 and the UMW \$1,400,000 on April 19, 1948, for "willfully" disregarding a temporary restraining order which directed them to call off a month-old walkout for \$100-a-month pension. The U. S. court of appeals last month upheld the fines.

The levy was exactly double the fines upheld by the Supreme Court a petition which contended that the 1948 restraining order violated rights of free speech, picketing, assembly, the right to bargain collectively, and that it abridged the liberty of contract.

Soldier's Grave For Ernie Pyle

HONOLULU — (AP) — Ernie Pyle, famous World War II correspondent and idol of the GI's for his front line reporting, will be buried at the National Cemetery of Pacific alongside an unknown soldier.

Pyle will be laid to final rest on July 19 in a ceremony which will signify the public opening of the burial place on Punchbowl Crater overlooking Honolulu and the ocean.

With Pyle will rest the remains of 12,000 veterans of World War II with other plots set aside for future military dead and former war veterans.

The columnist was killed on Ie Shima, near Okinawa, in 1945 by a Japanese bullet.

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Scientists View Electric 'Gun'

LONDON — (AP) — An electric "gun" using charges equal to 30 million volts of electricity is under study as a possible weapon against cancer.

Specialists and Ministry of Health officials opened experiments at the Royal Cancer Hospital with the apparatus, called a synchrotron. The highly charged energy particles it fires are so potent that the huge machine was buried under 70 tons of earth to prevent unwanted radiation, and the operator watches it through a water-filled peep hole.

Doctors said the synchrotron's medical significance lies in its ability to produce x-rays of high energy and unusual penetrating power. First tests will be to study the rays themselves, they said. Later biological effects of the rays on organisms and animal tissues will be checked.

The synchrotron shown is the first to be developed solely for medical purposes, specialists said.
