Vina Smith

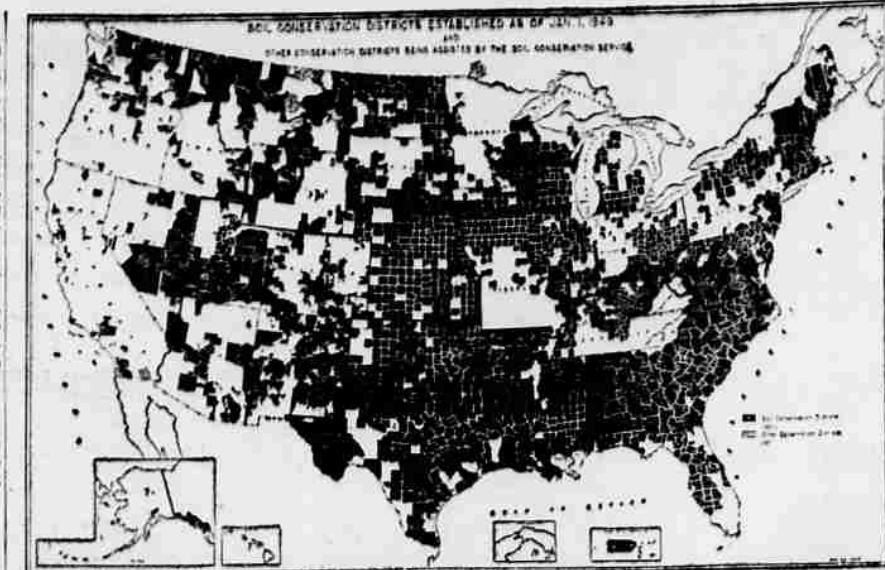

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THIS MAP shows how effectively the Soil Conservation Service has assisted in establishing districts throughout the nation. There are over 2100 districts in the United States and complete coverage in Alabama, South Carolina, Delaware, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and territories of Porto Rico and Virgin Islands.

Conservation Districts Viewed

(This is another in a series of articles designed to acquaint Lane County residents with the workings of and benefits to be derived from a Soil Conservation District.)

Soil conservation districts pretty well blanket the nation, with most of the states completely covered. Oregon has only about 10 per cent of its land in districts as compared with almost 75 per cent for Washington.

The western states show the following number of districts—California, 55; Idaho, 28; Nevada, 18; Oregon, 27; and Washington, 53.

The Oregon land in districts comprises only approximately five

and one-half million acres, and much of this is in a few districts of rangelands. Most of the districts in the state are small because they were organized as the nuclei for future larger organizations.

"In the past, it took 50 per cent of the farmers in a prospective district, plus one, to organize," explains Ronald Elmes, district conservationist stationed in Eugene. "Now, a new law, soon to go into effect, makes it easier to form districts."

Should Be More Districts
The result should be more districts in the county and state, Elmes said. The new law makes it possible for districts to be or-

ganized on the best economical basis, he stated.

Elmes said that there are several petitions in now for districts in the state.

'No Cost'
"It has been proven that districts don't cost the farmers anything," Elmes pointed out. "And nationally, the people don't suffer because the cost of organization is offset by increased yields, due to good land practice."

All districts are financially solvent, with many of them owning their equipment and hiring and firing personnel. Organization of districts in the nation, has come about mainly during the past 15 years, Elmes declared.
