

Middlecoff Wins Reading Tourney

READING, Pa., July 11 — (U.P.) Middlecoff, who putted with Dr. Cary, won the Reading Open golf tournament Sunday.

The victory was worth \$2600 for Middlecoff and permitted him to pass Snead by \$389 in their cross-country rivalry for leading money winner of the year honors.

Middlecoff's earnings now stand at \$13,749 while Snead banked \$1900 as runner-up and boosted his year's golf profits to \$13,360.

After Middlecoff and Snead, there was hardly anyone else in the tournament so far as the scores indicated.

Johnny Palmer, Badin, N. C., took third prize of \$1400 by shooting a 66 for a four-day aggregate of 274 that was eight strokes off the pace.

Herman Keiser, St. Andrews, Ill., came next with 275 on the strength of a final-round blistering 65. Keiser, who pocketed \$1150, was followed by Henry Ranso, St. Andrews, Ill., with a 276 score which tied Vic Ghezzi, Deal, N. J.

Fred Haas, Jr., New Orleans, and Ed Furgol, Royal Oak, Mich., were deadlocked at 277, and Buck White, Greenwood, Miss., and Pete Cooper, Ponte Verda, Fla., were neck and neck with 278's.

Pee Wee School Attracts Kids

A "Pee-Wee" Baseball School for boys, 7 through 14 years of age is being conducted at the 20th and Washington baseball fields every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, both mornings and afternoons. During these sessions, the fundamentals of batting, base running, fielding, and the playing of all positions in baseball are taught.

The schedule for the classes is as follows: Morning classes, 8 to 10 a. m.—ages 7 to 9 years; 10 to 12 noon—ages 10 to 11 years. Afternoon classes, 1 to 3:30 p. m.—ages 12 to 14 years. All boys of these ages are welcome to attend these classes.

There are from one-hundred and fifty to two hundred boys attending the morning classes and an average of one-hundred a day in the afternoon classes. There is a total attendance of 1100 boys a week.

Willie Steele Signs With L. A. Rams

LOS ANGELES, July 9 — (U.P.) — Willie Steele, Olympic broad jump champion, was signed to a professional football contract today, the Los Angeles Rams of the National Pro Football League announced.

The Negro athlete has played only about a half-dozen games of football in his life. Last year at San Diego State College he broke his leg in the first scrimmage of the season.

Steele played a few games while in the army.

He is noted for having made the second longest broad jump on record last year in the NCAA track and field meet when he leaped 26 feet, 6 inches, to come within 2 1/2 inches of Jesse Owens' world mark.

The Rams announced they opened negotiations with Steele after he was ruled ineligible for further college competition under the four-year rule. He will be groomed for a halfback berth where his speed can be used to best advantage. Steele has a 100-yard dash mark of 9.7 seconds.
