

Three Boys Shaken In Plane Accident

PORTLAND —(AP)—Three boys enjoying a free airplane ride and their pilot were shaken this week when a light plane crashed in landing at a neighborhood civic club airshow.

Two other boys riding bicycles past the spot were knocked to the ground when the plane plunged toward spectators.

Shaken and bruised slightly were Elmo Good, 14, Salem; Don Kitchens, 14, Salem; and Val Roth, 11, Portland. The pilot, George Putnam, Portland, was unharmed.

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Springfield City Council Grants Bus Fare Increase

SPRINGFIELD — Bus fares within the city limits will be a flat 10-cents effective July 15 and a round trip to Eugene will cost 35-cents.

Rate increases were granted the City Transit Lines by the city council Monday night. The council's decision to allow an increase came after C. J. Wendt, general manager of the company, told councilmen "we are in need of immediate relief." Wendt said the company's business had fallen off 25-per cent in the past year.

Student Tickets
Wendt explained that price of student tickets and one-half fare rates would remain unchanged.

The company has also been granted rate increases in Eugene and Salem.

During the four-hour session the council covered a multitude of topics, but made few definite decisions. Most matters were either referred to committee for more study or tabled.

When the problem of paving city streets arose, Mayor B. P. Larson suggested that the city follow Eugene's method of paving by assessing property owners for paving costs with the city paying for alleys and intersections.

Larson also said that 10th street should be among the first streets paved. (No streets have been paved in Springfield since 1913).

City Judge Robert Carmichael told councilmen that the traffic problem in the Paramount district was extremely serious and needed immediate attention.

Carmichael said motorists had been parking incorrectly in that area, but that there had been no signs or instructions to clarify where drivers could park. The council decided to instruct policemen to issue warning tickets only, except in the case where drivers were parking facing the wrong direction — tickets will be given for this violation.

In other action the council: 1—Approved a resolution accepting the county's offer to relinquish jurisdiction of certain streets in the Nicholas Gardens area. The county court has agreed to oil portions of the streets before the city takes them over.

2—Turned down two proposals from private parties to purchase a strip of city property.

3—Approved the recommendation for the establishment of a setback next to the proposed city hall.

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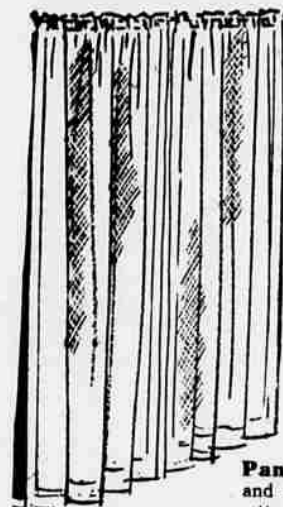
