RECIPE HINTS

Pineapple-Peach Cheese Pie (Serves 8)

One package frozen peaches, 1 package frozen pineapple, 1/2 pound package cream cheese, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon almond flavoring, 1 cup heavy sour cream, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon brandy or sherry (optional) or lemon juice.

Defrost fruit according to instructions on package; drain. Put drained peaches through sieve or mash with fork. Beat cheese, eggs and sugar together; add flavoring and 1 cup peach pulp. Pour into a 9-inch unbaked pastry shell. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees F.) for 25 to 35 minutes or until firm. Cool.

Mix sour cream, 2 tablespoons sugar and brandy, sherry or lemon juice. Spread over top of cooled pie. Return to 375 degrees F. (400 degrees F. (moderately hot) oven for 15 minutes or until sour cream topping is firm. Garnish with

Honey-Lemon Layer Cake

One-half cup shortening, 1 cup honey, 2 eggs, 2 cups sifted cake flour, 1/4 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/4 cup milk.

Cream shortening with honey until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, and beat well after each addition. Sift together the flour, baking soda and salt. Add lemon juice to milk. Combine sifted dry ingredients to creamed mixture alternately with lemon soured milk. Pour into 2 greased 8-inch layer cake pans. Bake 20 to 30 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.).

Honey Lemon Cream Filling

Yield: filling for two 8-inch layers)
One egg yolk, 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1/4 cup honey, 1/4 cup water, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1/4 teaspoon grated lemon peel, 2 tablespoons butter. Beat egg yolk in top of double boiler. Combine sugar and cornstarch hand mix into egg yolk and add remaining ingredients. Cook over boiling water until mixture is thickened, about 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Frost with 7-minute frosting.

Firemen Busy In Springfield

SPRINGFIELD — The fire department is having its busiest month in history. At the present rate the record of 24 alarms in one month, recorded in January and June of this year, will be far exceeded.

The department answered alarms 14 and 15 Monday afternoon. A grass fire at 1100 3rd St. was extinguished without damage at 12:53 p.m. The second call sounded two hours later, turned out to be a false alarm. City Manager Fred Cheatham said the main whistle was blown when a wire shorted. The eerie alarm went off again at 2:50 p.m., but Cheatham said it was sounded a second time for testing purposes.

Normally the alarm can be sounded by cranking a generator from the fire department. The short, however, set it off prematurely. The first false alarm will be counted as a regular call because the equipment was ready to go and volunteers reported to their stations.

Abandoned Children Found in Small Cabin

PORTLAND—(P)—Two youngsters were in a hospital here Tuesday after seven brothers and sisters, aged 14 months to 10 years, were found alone in a 12-foot square cabin east of the city.

The sheriff's office said a two-year-old girl had lobar pneumonia and a 14-month-old sister also was ill. The others nursed sores attributed to malnutrition.

Parents of the children were believed in the Pendleton area, selling berries picked east of Gresham over the weekend. A neighbor was supposed to be caring for the youngsters, but the sheriff's investigators said the woman was employed elsewhere all day.
