Yost, Duden Post Triumphs

LOS ANGELES, July 13.—(AP)—Old man upset continued to hold the dominating role Tuesday as the field in the National Amateur Public Links championship was trimmed down to 64 aspirants for the crown.
The third and last ex-champion was drilled out of the tournament and two linksmen who whipped two popular choices Monday joined him on the sidelines as play progressed through the second round at the Rancho municipal course.
Par 35-36—71 was safe from serious assault for the most part. Andy Swedko, former title winner from Pennsylvania, was beaten one up on the 20th hole, by Vernon Smith of Texas.
Young Tom Marlowe, Portland, Ore., who Monday trounced the 1948 champion, Mike Ferentz, bowed out Tuesday before the nice play of Denver's Harry Gurely, 3 and 2.
Frank Rutkiewicz of Honolulu, who eliminated last year's runner-up, Ben Hughes, Portland, in the first round, was beaten, one up on the 19th hole, by local amateur Larry Bouchey.
These defections opened wider the already wide open title scramble.
Locker room little-tattle centered on the unusual and somewhat comical feud between two contestants, Ted Grassi of Erie, Pa., and Mike Di Cesaro of Houston, Tex.
Grassi was disqualified in a match with Di Cesaro Monday for using an illegally faced club—a three-iron. Di Cesaro is a sectional Public Links Committee member of the U.S. Golf Association.
Tuesday when Di Cesaro began his match with Sylvester Ferrera of San Francisco, Grassi's clubs—a six-iron—and it subsequently was ruled illegal.
Di Cesaro said he carried it along intentionally but did not use it, knowing it was illegal. He asked to be disqualified, presumably because he was upset over the incident involving Grassi the day before.
In any event, Di Cesaro lost to Ferrera by default—the tournament so officially ruled.
The oldest contestant, Gomer Sims of Los Angeles, local city champion and 48 years of age, lost to Portland's crack Victor Gildemeister, 5 and 3. Gildemeister's 31 was one of the lowest nine hole scores Monday. He was three under par but was three over Tuesday.
Dick Yost and Bob Duden, rated the one-two threats of the Portland, Ore., survivors, advanced. Yost, Oregon State College student and champion of the Northern Division of the Pacific Coast Conference, won from Libero Giacomini, Ottawa, Ill., 8 and 7, and Duden, a salesman, defeated Roy Shortridge, St. Paul, 4 and 3.

SMU's Johnson May Turn Pro

AUBUREY, Tex., July 13.—(AP)—Gilbert Johnson, southern Methodist University's spectacular passer, said Tuesday night he would know "definitely Wednesday afternoon" whether he would turn professional.
"My age is the main thing," he said in a telephone interview.
Johnson, 23, is the ringmaster in Southern Methodist's crack "aerial circus." He had been counted on heavily this fall in the Mustang's bid for a third South-west Conference championship.
Johnson said he had been offered a contract by the New York Yankees of the All-American Conference and also had been contacted by the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Professional League.
He said he was to talk to the New York club Wednesday afternoon.

Northwest Golf Tourney Begins

SEATTLE, July 13.—(AP)—Twice as hot as the summer sun, Seattle's Harry Givan plucked the medal Tuesday in the Pacific Northwest Golf Association's tournament with 136 for 36 holes—10 under par.
The former Walker Cupper, who tacked a 70 on top of Monday's 66, led the field by four strokes. Jack Westland, of Everett, Wash., and Eli Bariteau, San Jose, Calif., were second at 142, each with 70s Tuesday.
Glenn Sheriff of Seattle, the defending champion, qualified automatically and did not turn in his card, although he had a two-round total of 149.
Thirty-two places were open for the match play that starts Wednesday and leads up to the title round Saturday. There were 33 men with scores of 150 or better, and the three who had 150 met in a sudden-death play-off to eliminate the extra man early Wednesday morning.
The three were Duke Matthews of Olympia, Ray Weston, 1947 PPGA champion from Spokane, and Jim Shrover of Seattle.
Both Givan and Westland were steady all the way. Bariteau poked a long iron into the No. 6 cup for an eagle two to help his score. Two other Seattle men, King County Public Links champion Tom Boucher and Harold Gjolve, were locked in fourth spot with 143. Two strokes farther back were Johnny Dawson, Los Angeles, Bill Mawhinney, Vancouver, B. C., Bruce McCormick, Hollywood, and Dr. Jackson Bean, San Francisco. Mawhinney, after a torrid 69 Monday, tumbled into a pile of trouble on his first nine Tuesday and had to shave a stroke off the back nine par-38 to carve a 70.
Sheriff and Dave Doud of Tacoma, joined Bariteau in the eagle department, the champion getting his with a 50-foot putt on number nine for a three, and Doud cracking out two long woods and a short putt for a three on No. 18.
Ron Clark, University of Oregon golfer, qualified for the match rounds with a 74-72-146 and George Harrington of Medford made the list with a 72-75-147.
