Willamette High School Construction Progresses

Work on the new Willamette High School for Bethel School District No. 52 is progressing satisfactorily and on schedule, according to Tom Powers, superintendent of the district.

The new \$373,000 school, located on Echo Hollow Rd., southwest of Pacific Highway 99 N., will be completed for fall enrollment of students, Powers said Tuesday. It is being constructed on part of a 30-acre tract owned by the district.

The name Willamette High School was selected by students who will attend, at an election held in May. At that time, maroon and white were chosen as school colors.

When completed the school will immediately accommodate nearly 1000 students. It will consist of a large workshop, gymnasium, classrooms, cafeteria, library, and will incorporate the most modern design.

Architects for Willamette High School are Wilmsen and Endicott, Eugene. Waale-Camplian Co., Portland, is the contractor.

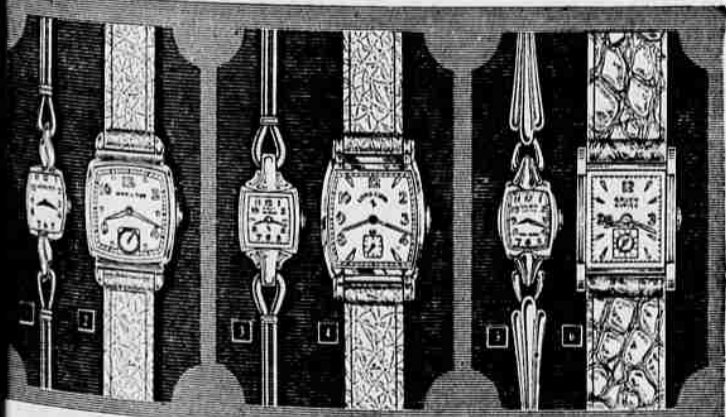
