

Changes Saturday

Starting Saturday, numerous changes in collection times and locations in various Eugene areas will go into effect, according to Postmaster Eban Newman. The changes will affect about 100 mail boxes and the new schedule will be posted in the boxes directly, and the new schedule will affect mail service in many more.

Changes in routing and types of boxes, including box locations, addresses have been outlined for a family whose service will be changed.

Individual notices have been sent with instructions as to the new schedule and as to what the new schedule will be, Newman said. Interest to businessmen is expected to be high after the afternoon parcel post delivery in the Eugene business district and additional downtown boxes.

Collection times for downtown mail will be announced by placards on mail boxes. The first time since the war, it will be a 9 p.m. collection in business areas.

Newman explained that heavy increase in Eugene and surrounding areas have made it necessary to make additional routes.

Marines Hit Crete Beach In Training

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Miller Requests State Hearing

SALEM—(AP)—Dr. Horace G. Miller, psychiatrist at the Oregon State Hospital who was fired July 6 for insubordination, asked the State Civil Service Commission Friday to review his case.

The hearing probably will be held within two weeks.

When Dr. Miller filed his appeal, he issued a statement to the press blasting William Ryan, state coordinator of institutions.

He charged that Ryan is opposed to sound psychiatric principles, and accused Ryan of giving "distorted and misleading information" to the Board of Control.

Ryan didn't answer Dr. Miller's statement.

"Anything I have to say will be before the Civil Service Commission," Ryan said.

Dr. Miller was dismissed by Dr. C. E. Bates, superintendent of the hospital.

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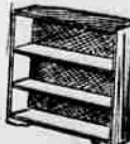
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
