Signs of the Past In Heart of Felled Fir At Road-Relocation Job

DEXTER—One more oddity of the growth of nature any man's invention has shown up in the construction work being done on the relocation of the highway.

A 14 inch second growth fir was cut on the right-of-way of the Harry Lyons place above Dexter. In splitting it for winter's wood, Lyons found a telephone insulator buried five inches into the wood.

Between 40 and 45 rings were counted. Growing around the insulator for two inches in a curved position, it had again straightened out and the last three inches was perfect grain.

It was a three inch sapling when the insulator was driven in at shoulder height and now reached 20 feet. Old timers decided that at was from a telephone line from the Charlie Williams Logging Camp in about 1906. This telephone line was from Dexter to Goshen.
