Jacobs Scores Pegler Intellect

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Rep. Andrew Jacobs, (D-Ind.) characterized Columnist Westbrook Pegler as a man who has "acquired a calcified intellect."

Jacobs' statement was in reply to a column written by Pegler and published Thursday. The column was highly critical of Jacobs' conduct as chairman of a House labor subcommittee investigating union racketeering.

Pegler recently was subpoenaed to testify before the subcommittee on his knowledge of labor racketeers. At the end of the testimony, Jacobs said he was "disappointed over the lack of information offered by Mr. Pegler."

In his column, Pegler described the hearing as "ballyhoo for the racketeers themselves and for this fellow's (Jacobs) law practices."

In reply, Jacobs said: "I have come to the conclusion that since Mr. Pegler endorsed lynching in 1938, and, in effect, the Communist Party in 1936, he apparently has no more permanency of mind than he has facts or information. But perhaps he will be more stable in the future because he has acquired a calcified intellect."
