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Soil Improving At Harrisburg

HARRISBURG—Supervisors of the Linn-Lane Soil Conservation district held their monthly meeting Monday at the Soil Conservation office in Harrisburg.

Applications to the district for technical and mechanical assistance in installing irrigation, drainage, and soil improving rotations have been received from 67 farmers in the district.

Soil conservation surveys have been made on 20,155 acres and conservation farm plans have been developed with 43 farmers on 13,993 acres.

Engineering surveys have been made recently for drainage or irrigation for Paul Quimby, Charles and Dean Curtis, Beryl and Charles Kizer and Hubert Willoughby.

District equipment is clearing land in the Lake Creek area and will soon be moved to do land leveling work for O. D. Kropf, Hubert Willoughby, Chas. Swango, Malpass Bros. and Reese Jarnagin. Over 100 acres is yet to be leveled for irrigation before winter rains begin. Detailed engineering surveys and cost estimates are made before land leveling work by carryall is started, according to Reese Jarnagin, equipment supervisor.

Dean Curtis has completed leveling work on 28 acres with the Linn-Lane Soil Conservation district carryall and tractor. Engineers with the Soil Conservation Service survey the fields, made a cost estimate and staked the area. Border irrigation is to be used.
