INGTON—The United States and Britain have a note which Secretary of State sent to the Yugoslav government in violation of the Peace Treaty by introducing the Yugoslav currency into its territory.

The note said the Yugoslav administration "has violated the Peace Treaty by introducing the Yugoslav currency into its territory and has followed a policy calculated to tie the Yugoslav economy more closely to the Yugoslav economy."

Officer Michael McDermott, in making the note public, said he understood the British government has taken similar action.

The British-American action apparently was taken to allay Italian fears that the currency move by Yugoslavia was intended to pave the way for outright annexation of the Yugoslav zone of Trieste.

\$1 a Pound For Big Halibut

SEATTLE—Ola Ivar Haglund, owner of a waterfront restaurant and an aquarium, made a pre-season offer of \$1 a pound for the heaviest halibut caught in the 1949 season.

The average price per pound is from 18 to 20 cents. And the average halibut seldom runs higher than 130 pounds.

Friday, Haglund was called to the dock where the schooner McKinley, in from Yak Flats just outside Kodiak, Alaska, was unloading its catch. His eyes popped when he was shown their biggest fish.

The jumbo halibut was seven feet, four inches long and weighed 275 pounds. After it was cleaned it tipped the scale at 225 pounds.

It was the biggest halibut reported this season.

Five men were needed to land the monster. Don Johnson, a crew member, smashed a finger when he hung onto the fish all alone after gaffs of the other four men slipped off.

With the contest officially closed at 3 p. m. Friday, Haglund paid off and said he would display the "two-Ton Tony" of the deep in front of his restaurant.
