Airmen Save Buddy's Life

PORTLAND—(AP)—A National Guard airman thanked two flying buddies Monday for saving his life when he found he had injured his neck and couldn't turn his head around to see the instrument board of his plane. The airman, 1st Lt. John Haley, blacked out momentarily when his F-51 Mustang fighter stalled and snapped violently. When he recovered, his neck and head were twisted and paralyzed. Maj. Gordon Doolittle and Capt. Carl Bross, who were flying in

formation with him, noticed something was wrong. Getting in touch by radio, they instructed him how to pull his plane out of the stall. Doolittle and Bross guided Haley to the runway. One flew behind him to give the orders, while the other flew by his side to direct him when to level off for the landing. Haley made a perfect three-point landing at the Portland airbase. He stepped from the plane and immediately fainted. He was taken to a hospital to be treated for a dislocated neck vertebra. Only one person in 35 of the population of England owns an automobile.

New Metal Showing Set

SEATTLE — (AP) — A newly invented metal which requires no lubrication when made into bearings and bushings, will be demonstrated here soon. The metal, called coloco, manufactured by the Coloco Corp., Los Angeles, is composed of silver, lead and copper. The company claims the mixture is not an alloy, but a solidified emulsion of the three metals. In tests of the metal, the inventor, W. A. George, showed all the bearings and metal of an automobile engine, metal and drove them to the crankcase. The metal melts at 1000 Fahrenheit.
