Poster Contest For Pet Parade

Kindness to animals can be pic-
tured on a poster in innumera-
ble ways—and the Lane Coun-
ty Humane Society is prepared to
give prizes for the best—in a kids'
contest.

The posters must be on the gen-
eral subject of kind treatment of
animals and are intended to ad-
vertise the Humane Society's first
major project—a pet parade
which they will hold Aug. 6.
Deadline for getting the poster
turned in at the Oregon Trail Pet
Corral, 35 Eleventh Ave. West, is
5 p. m., Monday, July 25. After
judging, the drawings will be dis-
played in downtown windows.

First prize in the poster contest
will be a trophy similar to those
given in dog shows. Other prizes
will be donated by Lane County
merchants.

Any kind of paint, chalk, cray-
on, charcoal, pencil, etc., can be
used. The committee requests that
the drawings be on stiff paper or
mounted on cardboard so that they
can better be displayed. All pos-
ters are to be 11 and 14 inches,
and must contain these words:
"Pet Parade, Sponsored by Lane
County Humane Society." Name,
age and address of the artist must
be on the back of the poster.

Any child who has not passed his
17th birthday is eligible to
compete. Judges' decisions will be
final, and posters become the
property of the Humane Society.
Judging will be on originality and
neatness.

Detailed plans for the pet pa-
rade are to be announced. Any
child who has not passed his 17th
birthday is eligible to show his
pet, provided he has owned the
pet for at least two months. Local
merchants are donating prizes in
a number of classes.

Counties Can't Cut Employees by Law

SALEM—(P)—County courts
can't eliminate any employees
whose salaries are fixed by law,
Attorney General George Neuner
ruled Tuesday.

The opinion was for Gilliam
County District Attorney William
Bennett, who asked if Gilliam
County could eliminate appropria-
tions for the county health nurse
and the county veterinarian.

Neuner said it was all right to
eliminate the nurse's salary, be-
cause it isn't required by law. But
the veterinarian's salary has to be
restored because the law requires
it.

SEATTLE—(P)—An unidenti-
fied seaman, who once was helped
on Seattle's Skidrow, returned
there late Monday and gave away
more than \$200 in small change
to eager men and women of all
ages.

A crowd gathered when he ap-
peared on a street corner and be-
gan passing out money, mostly in
quarters. Two policemen soon
appeared on the scene lined up
the group and had them pass in
file to receive their unexpected
donations.

Patrolman J. A. Bergin estimat-
ed that more than 500 persons
got a handout. He said the bene-
factor refused to give his name
and told him the deed was in re-
turn for aid he had received when
he was down and out.

After giving away the money,
the seaman, about 38 years of age,
jumped into an automobile and
drove away.

Highway Assn.

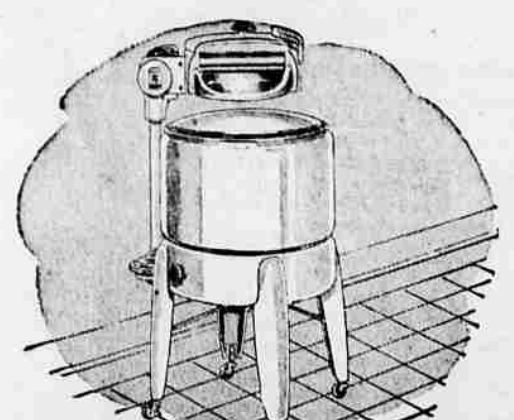
Schaefer said that directors of
