Council Talks Paving Plans

SPRINGFIELD—City paving was still "tentative" Monday night as the city council bogged down over discussion of a definite paving policy.

City Manager Fred Cheatham was instructed to look into the paving situation of neighboring cities. From this survey he will present a report outlining various ways the city launch its paving program.

Discussion of the council centered around the paving of 10th street. Mayor B. P. Larson favored such action, stating the thoroughfare took in the park and school district and went through the center of town. "We could pave 10th street next year with the gas tax and maybe add a couple of mills," he said.

Councilman Arthur McChesney said the estimated cost of paving 10th street from Main to include K street was \$78,000, with the city prepared to pay \$22,500 and property owners \$55,500.

Cheatham said the city needed a definite policy to predict what Springfield's paving picture would look like in five years. He pointed to Eugene, stating its storm drainage was taken care of by a special levy.

Councilman John Boeshans said the city should secure a compre- hensive paving picture. "We must see what the city can put in and what the people can han- dle. We should estimate the amount of paving for the year, then figure the cost. We must figure according to income."

McChesney said members of the street committee weren't en- gineers and asked why the commit- tee formulate the paving program. Larson assured the council, "we can't go wrong copying Eugene."

At this point Boeshans made a

motion instructing the city man- ager to make an analysis of paving programs of nearby cities.

An unexpected topic for discus- sion came up when Frank Miller, former city employee in the street department, appeared before the council asking why he had been fired June 25.

Miller told the council: "The mayor called me and asked me to come down. I have lost jobs be- fore and don't hold a grudge, but I was laid off in the middle of the month (June) and I want to know why I was fired."

The city manager then ex- plained the situation. "The present budget calls for only so many jobs and it happened we had more men than jobs. In working with street finance I have always tried to be fair. The decision was made to remove one man."

Miller retorted, "The street commissioner had something on his chest, but wouldn't come out and say it. I squawked about cleaning up and said we needed another truck. It couldn't have been my labor. I always did a day's work. I think I was fired because I didn't vote right."

Miller, living in Springfield when he was fired, charged that four street employees, hired after he was, were still working, al- though they didn't all reside inside the city limits.

McChesney told Miller the mat- ter would be referred to the street committee for investigation. At the same time Larson said the council should carry out the laws of the city and employ only citi- zens living within Springfield. Larson added non-city employees should be weeded out gradually.

Street Commissioner Paul Bas- ford Tuesday morning said the in- cident was nothing to get excited about, but made no official com- ment, stating he was not a spokes- man for the city.

After Councilman Boeshans left the meeting, the session became "actionless" as only three council- men were then on hand to carry on city business. Councilmen Frank Bouck and Fred Koneshot were unable to attend the meet- ing.

In other action, the council:

1—Authorized payment of \$150 to city attorney for legal work in connection with the \$86,000 bond issue.

2—Filed a report from Marvin Sanders, city attorney, stating members of the city council could not sell insurance to the city.

3—Authorized notice of a pub- lic hearing and a call for bids on three sewer projects August 1.

4—Granted Consulting Engi- neers Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield a time extension for the rendering of a domestic water survey report. Aug. 1 was set as the report date.

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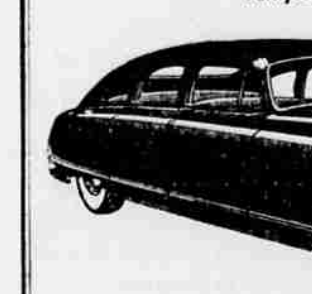
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
