

Liquor Is Legal This Week in 'Wet' Kansas

SALEM, Ore. — Liquor sale 1-a-g-a-l-l-y in this week. It marks the end of an era of bootlegging and multi-state bootlegging business. This long-time stronghold of the bootlegger has been banned in Kansas since the state constitution. And for the state bone dry law enforcement of so much as a drop of liquor punishable by law. Since November Kansas has been a bone dry state. A two months' struggle to retain local option, the state passed the bone dry law. It wiped the bone dry from the statute books. It followed four months of work to establish a licensing setup.

Late Monday, the State Liquor Control office will mail out licenses for more than 260 privately owned stores to retail liquor or high per cent beer. Beer of less than 3.2 per cent alcohol was legalized in 1937.

Despite the seemingly radical change for a traditionally dry state, no wild binge is in the making. Saloons and public drinking are barred. Liquor will be sold only in packages at stores licensed solely to sell intoxicants.

Kansas' desertion of prohibition leaves liquor illegal only in Oklahoma and Mississippi.

Disgruntled Kansans who had hoped to have drinking in hotels and restaurants and on trains legalized, say Kansas merely is being transformed from the "wet-test dry state into the driest wet state."

State Department Awards Study Grants

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The State Department announced this week that it has awarded study grants to a Roman Catholic priest and to a former naval officer to serve as visiting professors in Latin-American countries.

The recipients are the Rev. Harold F. Ryan, S.J., associate professor of English at Loyola University, Los Angeles, and Commodore Penn Leary Carroll, USN, retired.

Father Ryan will serve as visiting professor in American literature at the Catholic university of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, for three months beginning in August.

Carroll will fill the post of visiting professor of electrical engineering for the coming year at the Technological Institute of Monterrey, Mexico.

Applesed Legend Recalled As Crop Begins to Ripen

WASHINGTON — (AP) — When an estimated 100,000,000-bushel apple crop ripens next fall in the nation's orchards, the legend of Johnny Applesed will be remembered as the story of a man who dedicated his life to planting apple trees in the American wilderness.

John Chapman, the historic original of Johnny Applesed, may not have been so unselfish, according to the National Geographic Society. The known facts about him are that he was born on a farm in Leominster, Mass., shortly before the American Revolution, that he attended Harvard College for a short time, and that he emigrated to the Ohio-Illinois frontier around 1801. He died in Fort Wayne, Ind., in 1845.

The less romantic version, the society said, describes Johnny as a go-getting business man, who saw in the rapidly-growing number of emigrants to Ohio and Illinois an opportunity to capitalize on the lack of fruit trees in the fertile free land across the Ohio River. Built Thriving Business.

He collected apple seeds from western Pennsylvania cider presses to start nurseries at points along the wagon trail from Pittsburgh to Illinois. By selling or bartering his young trees to emigrants, John Chapman built a thriving business, leaving a small fortune when he died.

But, as the society says, the other and more enduring story of Johnny Applesed tells how he became a devotee of the mystical doctrines of Emmanuel Swedenborg while a student at Harvard and traveled west as a missionary-philanthropist. Armed only with a Bible and a bag of apple seeds, he became a minister, not only to the spiritual but to the physical health of the pioneers.

According to the legend, he carried on the work of propagating apple trees because he knew the worth of fresh fruit in preventing scurvy among the settlers during the years of clearing, plowing and sowing before the first harvests were reaped.

That is the traditional Johnny Applesed of poems and ballads, a frontier myth as dear to American hearts as Paul Bunyan and Buffalo Bill—a small, wizened figure, traveling barefoot and un-

Mob Terrorizes Florida Town

GROVELAND, Fla. — (AP) — Tension gradually eased Monday after a touchy weekend which saw an armed mob try to take two negroes out of jail. National Guard troops moved in to maintain order in this central Florida town, but left early Monday.

A touch of the Ku Klux Klan was here too. Pamphlets titled "Ideals of the Ku Klux Klan" were tossed from a group of about 20 cars which passed through.

Residents said three or four men were in each car; none wore the traditional Klan hoods and robes.

Sheriff W. V. McCall, who quieted the mob about 100 men that gathered at the county courthouse in Tavares Saturday night, said he wasn't around when the Klan literature was tossed.

The two negroes had been moved to another jail before the mob arrived, McCall reported because he expected trouble. They were arrested on an open charge in connection with the robbery of a white man and the kidnapping and subsequent rape of his wife early Saturday.

Sheriff McCall said the men who marched to the jail were armed "to the gills."

Returning here, the mob drove through the almost-deserted negro section and fired several shots into a restaurant and a house.

Most of the town's 400 negroes were moved to surrounding towns on trucks a few hours earlier.
