Phil's Hurler Improves With Every Season

PHILADELPHIA, July 21—(AP)—Most pitchers slow down as they grow older. Not Kenny Heintzelman—he gets faster and better.

Kenny, the forgotten man of the All-Star game, is no babe in arms to Major League warfare. He's been around since 1937, but never before has Kenny compiled a record such as 12-3 and pitched 26 straight scoreless innings.

But that's what Heintzelman, a tall southpaw from Peruque, Mo., who gets his paychecks from the Philadelphia Phillies, has done in 1949—at the age of 33.

Heintzelman never has had a winning record in the majors. Before this season, his bestmark was 11-11 with the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1941.

As far as Kenny is concerned, his success is largely a matter of speed.

"George Earnshaw (Phil's pitching coach) took me aside in spring training, Kenny said, "and told me I ought to speed up my delivery."

"I used to waste a lot of time fidgeting around on the mound and giving the batters plenty of time to get set," Heintzelman said. "Now I've gotten so I can keep them off balance."

Trotters In Action Here Saturday Night

Picking up in early Spring where shortly before the sensational basketball team of the same name and management had left off, the crack Harlem Globetrotters baseball team is on the road again and scheduled here against the Eugene All-Stars in a night game at 19th and Lawrence on Saturday, July 23 at 8 p.m.

This is only the fourth season of play for the diamonders, but in that short span of years they already have attained the reputation of being the finest of all the traveling novelty clubs. The septa stars, like their namesake basketballers, stress showmanship and power in copious quantities.

Traveling from coast to coast, with excursions into Mexico and Canada, the Globetrotter nine entered this season with a three-year record of 287 victories and 84 defeats for a percentage of .740.

Their first season saw them win 71 and lose 40, in 1947 they captured 77 and dropped 38, and last season, featuring a series against the crack Honolulu Hawaiians, they reached the top with a staggering 119 wins against only 28 defeats. A record of 35 wins against 16 defeats in games with the House of David in 1947 stamped the Trotters as the best of the nomad nines.

Paul Hardy, the great catcher and leader, is again managing the Globetrotters, whose personnel is star-studded with ranking septa players. The showmanship angle, a Saperstein trademark, is again very much in evidence. The fun-making department is headed once again by Ed Hamman, celebrated white sports clown who entertained at baseball world's series in Cleveland in October of 1948 and followed that up with a tour accompanying the Harlem Globetrotters basketball unit.

The Eugene All-Star roster boasts some of the strongest players who have been in action in the Cascade League during the past years. Dick Bishop and Del Koch will hold down the backstop position, with Bud Brewer, Don Reed and Mel Krause slated for mound duty.

The infield is made up of former University of Oregon and Cascade League stars, Jack Fassett, Don Kirsch, Barney Kock, Ray Stratton and Allie Cooper. In the outfield patches will be Charlie Mickelson, Pete Taylor, Ted Wilson and Bill Hamel.
