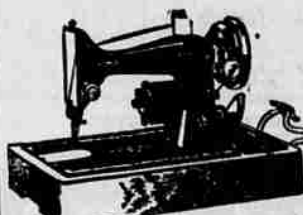
SCARES: NO DAMAGE
