

Rubes, Steen's Take Softball Encounters

The Rubes unloaded on the Vets for their biggest outburst of hits in several games and Ron Willoughby hurled a no-hit, no-run win for Steen's over the Planing Mill to highlight American League city softball action at 19th and Lawrence Thursday night. In the other senior circuit contest, Martin's had a 2-0 lead over Everybody's when the game was called because of the 10:30 p. m. softball curfew, but it was called a no contest with managers of both clubs agreeable to the ruling.

In the only Girl's League contest played, Irish-Swartz maintained their lead with a 12-6 verdict over Roy Coppings, while Standard Oil knocked Oldfield's from the undefeated ranks and the JCC's took B'nai B'rith in industrial action.

The Sofa-Sitters found vet hurler Glenn Warberg for 11 hits in taking their 14-1 victory over the VFW nine as Bob Willis held the losers to one single by Dale Hogan and one run, also scored by Hogan. The Rubes picked up their first two runs in the third frame, added a single in the fourth, three in the fifth and a rousing eight tallies in a big sixth inning splurge. Dale Warberg paced the Rubes hitters with three hits in four trips, Eddie Vannett getting a "two-for-three," Jimmy "The Kid" Northam and Ken Seeborg each picked up a pair of safeties.

Steen's measured the Planing Mill 8-0 in five innings as Willoughby set the Miller's down in order throughout the whole five frames, not one man reaching base, the Steen hurler attaining a perfect game. The Meatmen rose up for a single run in the first inning, added four in third and three in the fourth. Harry Walker paced the winner's hit parade with a pair in three trips.

The Everybody's-Martin game reached the top of the fifth before the game was called in accordance with the time limit, the Upholsterer's ahead 2-0 after a two-run outburst in the fourth stanza on two hits by Eddie Sanford and Tom Collie. By mutual agreement made between the managers before the game started, the contest was declared invalid at the time it was called.

Irish-Swartz opened the first half of the first inning with a four run spree to take the lead over Coppings and they never dropped it throughout the tilt. Bunney Walton and Chauncey were the leading stickers for the winners, each getting three hits in four trips.

The Grocery Girl's had a 7-2 lead at the end of the second, pushed this to 8-2 at the end of the third and polished off with a five run spurt in the fifth. Coppings' rose up for three runs in the fourth and a single in the fifth. Pracht was the leading hitter for the losing nine, two hits in three trips.

Johnny McBee hurled two-hit ball at Oldfield's as Standard Oil nailed the former Industrial leaders with a 6-1 decision. The Oilers took a 2-0 lead in the fourth frame and picked up their final four markers in a sixth inning splurge. The lone Oldfield tally came in the top of the seven when Gardiner tied into a slow pitch by McBee for a round-tripper into rightfield.

The Jr. Chamber of Commerce had to go nine innings before they could get a 7-6 verdict over B'nai B'rith in the other industrial contest. The score was tied 4-4 at the end of the sixth inning, and both teams scored a pair in the seventh. Neither team pushed a run across in the eighth, the JCC's finally copping the tilt in the bottom half of the ninth when two errors and one hit drove in the tie breaking run.

Irish Too Good for Academy Says Super

WEST POINT, N. Y., July 21—(AP)—Notre Dame's football team "is too good, consistently, for Army," Maj. Gen. Bryant E. Moore said Wednesday while explaining that it was unlikely the two would meet on the gridiron during his term as superintendent.

General Moore explained that he was in Europe during the time of the Irish-Cadet football break two years ago and that he had not been approached regarding resumption of the series since being installed as the successor to Brig. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor.

"Notre Dame is out of our league. It would take us a half season to get ready for that great squad and the other half to recover from the meeting," he said.

The new superintendent said he favored moving the Army-Navy game around the country instead of playing it always in Philadelphia.

Sauvain Gets No-No Five-Inning Victory
