Every morning, he stalks through the halls looking for notes such as "Joe, get me up at 7:45 whether I want to or not." He has a set routine for waking the students.

He empties the metal waste baskets by banging them against his steel disposal cart and then crashes the baskets on the linoleum floor. If that doesn't work, he drags the sleeper from his warm bed and stands him up. Only once has he been forced to take the third step, which includes a bucket of cold water.

During examinations when Joe finds notes on almost every door, he sounds a general alarm by dragging out his noisiest instrument—a floor polisher.

Watch Out, Route F: Maybe Lowell Folks Will Read This Too

ELMIRA—Route F, of all places, should be interested in making the most of the growing season and lately there have been a number of inquiries regarding the possibility of fall gardens.

All too few of us realize that we can grow most of our winter supply of vegetables without putting everything in cans.

A pamphlet by Ray W. Gill lists a number of vegetables that can be grown successfully in Oregon and left in the ground through the winter months. These items can be planted between now and Oct. 1, the right time and variety being the details most of us are wondering about. The following list will aid those who are not familiar with winter gardening in Oregon, and let's hope it's a mild winter!

Beans: Early bush type beans can be planted as late as Aug. 1. Beets and swiss chard can be planted right now.

Brussels sprouts can be transplanted as late as Aug. 10. Cabbage: early varieties may be seeded between Sept. 1-20. The plants will winter over in the ground (it's a gamble) and may be set out as early as possible in the spring.

Winter cabbage may be transplanted up to the first of August. Carrots, lettuce, onions and peas can all be planted on or about the first of August for late fall and winter use.

Cauliflower, kale, rutabagas may all go in as late as Aug. 10 for good results.

Turnips should be planted around Aug. 15 and early varieties can go in as late as the middle of September. These late plantings are especially good since they escape worm injury so prevalent in the spring crop. The same is true of radishes, which may be planted at the same time as the turnips.

Spinach may be planted from Aug. 15 and will be ready for use during October and November. September plantings may winter over in the ground and be available as soon as nice weather starts, as early as January or February.

So let's go, Route F, and let the Onion Editor know about the results! Lowell beat us this year on early green peas, but there are other vegetables!
