John H. Mock, Rt. 4, Eugene, died Friday at his home. Services and obituary will be released later by Schwering and England Mortuary in Creswell.

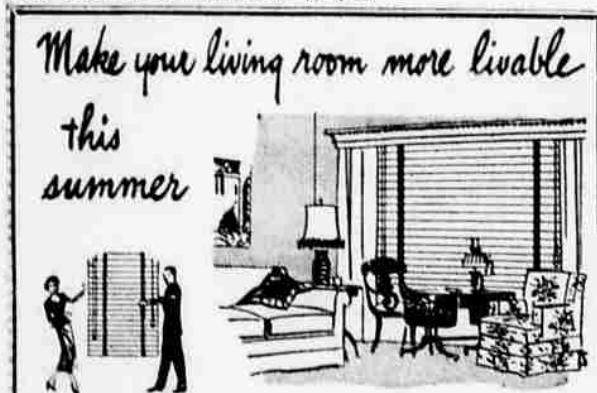

Water Situation To Be Debated

In an effort to obtain a better water supply for their community, members of the Braes Improvement Assn. will meet next Thursday with W. J. Moore, of the Eugene Water Board to discuss possibilities of getting city water.

All persons living in The Braes area are invited to the 7:30 p.m. meeting at the home of W. Paul Clark, The Braes.

Residents are now supplied with water by the College Crest Water District, according to Dr. Frank M. Wilson, a member of the Improvement group. He said the present supply is not sufficient.

Members of the group are considering two possibilities:

1. Obtaining city water through a line extended out South Chambers St., with a booster pump to bring the water to The Braes, which has an elevation of about 1000 feet.

2. Forming a community water supply system.

Wilson said residents at present must store water in containers during the morning to meet shortages that may occur later in the day.

Monologist Appears Here

The University of Oregon's guest artist Monday night will be Dorothy Crawford, known throughout the United States and Europe as the "one woman theatre." The noted monologist will appear before students and townspeople at 8 p.m. in the school of music auditorium. There will be no charge.

Miss Crawford is the fourth guest to appear as part of the summer session program at the University. The programs are under the direction of Dr. Vergil S. Fogdall, summer session director.

Miss Crawford is said to be an actress of tremendous versatility and unique appeal. In her original character sketches, ranging in mood through comedy, tragedy, satire, pathos, and humor. Critics have compared her with Ruth Draper and Cornelia Otis Skinner as one of the outstanding monologists of this day.

Among characters she will portray here are Veronica, a maid; The Harlequin, a little figure that plays a part in the lives of many people; All Things Come Home, a sketch of a mysterious woman who is followed to her hotel by a persistent news reporter; Sherry At Six, the traditional Sherry Party which represents a glimpse of some traditional English people; and "Rosa," the Italian mother in Fishermans Warf.

Local Directors Attend Chest Budget Confab

Calvin R. Smith, president of the Lane County Chest, and Alton F. Baker, vice-president, both members of the Oregon Chest board of directors, attended a budget meeting of the Oregon Chest in Portland last week.

Agencies which receive assistance from the Chest submitted budgets at this meeting, and Smith reported that requirements this year will be less than last. The total sum last year was \$446,000, and this year will be \$416,000.

A new agency admitted to the Chest is the USO, which has asked \$65,000. About \$5800 of this amount will be absorbed by the Lane County Chest.

Meanwhile, plans for the September appeal of the Lane County Chest are underway. A budget committee for the local and county group will meet this week to consider agency budgets.

Ed Pitkin, general chairman of the appeal, is now selecting division chairmen and other Chest leaders.

The appeal has been moved up from November to September this year to coincide with the National Community Chest campaign, Smith said.

Springfield Sewer Bids to Be Opened

SPRINGFIELD—Sealed proposals for the construction of sewers in three sections of the city will be opened and read by the city council August 1.

Largest sewer job will be undertaken in the Morning Drive area. Work in this area consists of approximately 4000 cubic yards of excavation and backfill, laying of 330 linear feet of 15 inch sewer pipe, laying of 4000 linear feet of eight inch sewer pipe, and the installation of 28 manholes.

Smaller projects will also be carried out in Keeney's first addition and in the Sunnyside addition. The city will accept sealed proposals until 5 p.m., August 1.

Fire Department Calls Reach New High Mark

SPRINGFIELD — The fire department's new monthly fire alarm record now stands at 32—eight calls above the previous monthly mark.

Latest calls answered by the department were Friday afternoon and evening when two cars leaking gas required attention at 321 Main St. at 3:55 p.m. and at 434 Main St. at 8:42 p.m.

At the present rate the monthly record could easily top the 40 mark, firemen said.
