Agean Quake Toll Reported by Agency

ISTANBUL, Turkey — (AP) — While unofficial sources put casualties much higher in Saturday's earthquake on the Aegean coast, the semi-official Anatolia news agency has reported two persons killed and four seriously injured.

The Greek Ministry of Public Order announced in Athens that two persons were killed and 48 injured on the Greek island of Khios, 12 miles off the Turkish coast, by the earthquake and the accompanying storm.

The tremors shook Izmir, Turkey's second largest port, where considerable property damage but no loss of life was reported.

Freighter Slices Cabin Craft

BOSTON — (AP) — The Coast Guard is probing a crash in which a freighter sliced a pleasure boat in two, leaving one dead and 19 injured strewn on harbor waters.

Mrs. Mary di Giovanni, 42, of Waltham, a passenger on the 38-foot cabin cruiser Marie S., was killed. The craft was chopped in two by the bow of the United States Lines' American Veteran, inbound from Philadelphia.

Witnesses said both were headed up the main ship channel in perfect weather at the time of the collision.

Thousands of Sunday excursionists watched as their vessels helped rescue the 20 Marie S. passengers and crew, tossed in a dazed condition in the big ship's boiling wake.

Coast Guard, Navy, police and private craft combined in prompt efforts which probably avoided a major disaster. Only the bow of the Marie S. remained afloat. It was later towed to port.

Capt. Lawrence B. Adams of Brooklyn, N. Y., master of the freighter, and Capt. I. Clarence Bailey, harbor pilot, were on the bridge at the time of the crash.

Bailey, a veteran pilot, said "at the time the ship was doing approximately 12 knots."

Capt. Charles E. Stevens, 50, skipper of the wrecked boat, who suffered a questionable fracture of the left wrist, said "I didn't see the freighter until it was too late."

Landlord Kills Tenant, Wife

ATLANTA — (AP) — Police here report that a landlord who killed a tenant, wounded the tenant's wife and then killed himself, left a note saying he did it "to show the OPA."

J. F. Bailey, 38, went berserk with a pistol in his rooming house. As his tenant, William J. Hays, came in from a movie, Bailey met him with a fatal blast of bullets. He then opened fire on Mrs. Hays and wounded her twice before she fled.

Finally he walked into his living room and put a bullet through his own heart.

Neighbors said Bailey had tried for two months to get the Hays' to move out of the two rooms they rented from him. He claimed they stayed up too late and kept his other tenants awake.

Officers investigating the shooting found a note written by Bailey in which he said he was going to "kill Bill Hays and his wife and show the OPA they can't Joe Stalin me around."

"I'll just show the OPA the Hays' can be moved," the note read.

Plane Crashes At Florence

FLORENCE — A four-passenger Stinson plane from the Sunset Flying Service, Hoquium, Wash., crashed in taking off from the Florence Airfield, about 5 p.m. Sunday.

Four passengers walked away from the crash uninjured. The pilot was Leo J. Kosenski of Aberdeen, Wash. Names of the others, three men and one woman, were not obtained as they left the scene immediately. They were in Florence to attend a Coast Guard telephone maintenance reunion and picnic.

The area where the plane crashed is so heavily wooded that a portion of the searching party, familiar with the ground, got lost in searching for it. It was not visible from the air. The plane was found by Bill Karnowski about 500 yards northeast of the Florence garbage dump and about a mile northwest of the field.

The passengers and pilot walked out to the Coast Guard Road, a distance of about two miles.

The pilot was having trouble with his engine before the take-off, according to Karnowski, and Martin Pedersen, pilots at the field who gassed the plane just before the takeoff. They advised the pilot not to go. The plane rose safely, then stalled and nose-dived. It sheared off bull pines two feet in diameter. It did not burn.

VATICAN CITY — (AP) — The archbishop of Genoa has warned that bathing suits worn by men as well as women on Italy's beaches "open the doors to the worst kind of immorality."

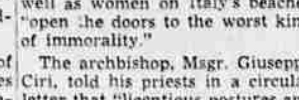
The archbishop, Msgr. Giuseppe Ciri, told his priests in a circular letter that "licentious postures and shameless exhibitionism... commonly allowed on the beaches, especially the most noted ones, certainly violate moral law."

The letter, published by the vatican organ Osservatore Romano, admonished parents that by exposing their children "to the danger of the worst resorts they ran the risk of committing mortal sin."
