A spokesman for the Eugene Fruit Growers' Assn. told the council of difficulties and hazards involved in the delivery of produce to the Eugene cannery under present conditions with High St. limited to use by northbound traffic.

On recommendations of its public works committee, the council waived height limits imposed by the comprehensive zoning ordinance to allow a Portland firm to construct a \$700,000, six-story apartment house between the Millrace and Eleventh Ave. on High St.

The apartment plan, as described to the council, is for a 72-unit structure which will cost \$700,000. The building will be of concrete, fireproof, soundproof, wired for television, equipped with a roof garden and provided with adequate parking space.

Other Monday night actions of the council included the awarding of 13 street paving projects and authorization of bid calls for four more paving jobs and two important sewer construction jobs.

Contracts awarded and the streets to be paved: Ash, from Clark to Cheshire, Central Heating Co., \$3524; Lincoln, from 23rd to 26th, Central Heating Co., \$18,674; 22nd Ave., from Harris to University, Central Heating Co., \$7099; Friendly, 19th to 24th, Stien Bros., \$33,612 (for 7-inch concrete); Potter, from 24th to 25th, Central Heating Co., \$4419; Charnelton, from 24th to 25th, Central Heating Co., \$6945; Monroe, Clark to Cheshire, Central Heating Co., \$3344; Fillmore, Broadway to 11th, Inter-city Sand and Gravel Co., \$5270; Lawrence, 23rd to 24th, Inter-city Sand and Gravel Co., \$5042; 33rd Ave., Willamette to McMillan, Glenwood Sand and Gravel Co., \$2281; Van Ness, from 25th to Reed, Central Heating Co., \$8372; 26th Ave., Chula Vista to Van Ness, Stien Bros., \$2883 (for 7-inch concrete); Onyx, from Franklin to 13th, Glenwood Sand and Gravel Co., \$8954 (for 7-inch concrete).

The streets for which paving bids will be called as the result of improvement petitions signed by owners of the majority of the affected properties are: Oak, from 16th to 19th; Pearl from 17th to 19th; Potter from 25th to 26th, and Friendly from 18th to 19th.

Bids on these projects will be opened Aug. 5 at 2 p. m., and at the same time bids will be opened

Judge Delays Portland Taxes

PORTLAND — A circuit judge Monday ordered the city of Portland not to put its new revenue-raising ordinance into effect before Aug. 15.

Judge James W. Crawford set a hearing for that date on whether a permanent injunction against the tax program should be issued.

Three suits have been filed against the city, by the Retail Trade Bureau, the Association of Automobile Dealers, and the Business Brokers of Oregon. The latter, a group of real estate men, filed suit Monday morning.

The judge said he had taken into consideration the "somewhat unusual method of municipal legislation," which made a referendum on the ordinance almost impossible.

The city had enacted a long series of ordinances, rather than a single one which could have been submitted to referendum. They increase license fees, and set percentage taxes on gross sales of business firms.

The council Monday night approved a request from School District No. 4 to permit alteration of the second floor of the city hall intended to provide more space for the school offices.

The council also directed that procedures be started immediately to open 22nd and 23rd Aves. from Friendly to Adams St. so that these routes may serve the new Adams St. elementary school.

Dulles Assigned To Group

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Senate Republicans Tuesday assigned Sen. John Foster Dulles (R-NY) to the committees on post office and civil service and the District of Columbia.

The New Yorker, appointed to succeed Sen. Robert F. Wagner (D), was given committee assignments closely paralleling those given other "freshmen" senators although he is one of his party's top foreign policy experts.

The GOP conference assigned Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Cal.), to the appropriations committee. Knowland was bumped off appropriations last January when Democrats regained control of Congress. He was reassigned Tuesday because Republicans were given an additional committee seat.

Three Minors Fined For Having Liquor

Three minors, arrested by state police, were arraigned in District Court Tuesday Morning on charges of possessing liquor. All three were from Cottage Grove.

Two of the boys, both of them 17, were fined \$35 each and \$5 costs with \$10 suspended. The third boy, 15, was turned over to juvenile authorities. One of the older boys was charged with violation of the basic rule. His license was suspended for 6 months.

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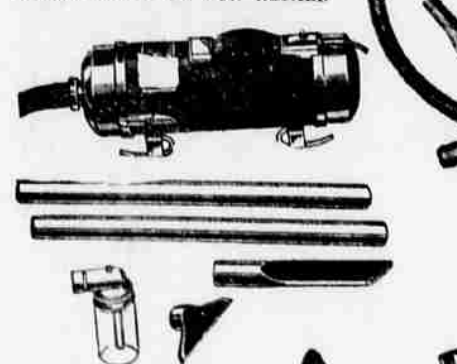
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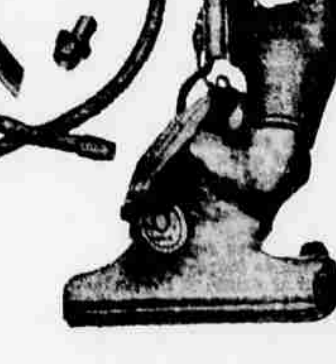
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
