

Southern Lane Roads Discussed

More than 40 southern Lane residents met Monday night to discuss their road situation. Frank Daly, Culp Creek, was chairman of the meeting. Present were county commissioners Walter Holland and Lee Raish, also county surveyor P. M. Morse and Roadmaster Fred Smigley.

The residents expressed dissatisfaction with the condition of roads leading east and west from Cottage Grove, and were told by

the court that plans for resurfacing the roads were in the offing. Commissioner Holland said that construction was being held up "until rains settled the roads so that oiling could be done."

Raish then explained plans for construction and resurfacing roads in his territory—the northern half of the county. He said that the old roads would be used as a base and that concrete would be poured over that.

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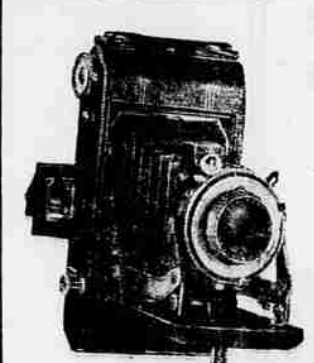
