Train Derailed
In Florida

ALMA, Fla. — (AP) — Five cars
of the northbound Florida-to-Chi-
cago train, The Southland, were
derailed here early Wednesday
when a switch was thrown acci-
dentally as the train passed over
it. No one was seriously injured.

Bill Burns, yardmaster for the
Atlantic Coast Line railroad at
nearby Thomasville, Ga., said the
derailed cars included four Pull-
man cars and a diner.

A few Pullman passengers were
"shaken up and scratched a lit-
tle," Burns said, but they were
treated immediately by a railroad
doctor aboard the train and trans-
ferred to the day coaches, which
continued on to Atlanta after a
short delay.
