Recipe Hints

For your easy meat planning here are two "different" salad dressings, making use of the old-fashioned sweetened condensed milk, for summer salad suppers. Savory Chili Salad Dressing is excellent for meat, vegetable and macaroni salads, and fruit salad. Mayonnaise for dessert-salads. The Borden Company offers them as tested recipes:

Savory Chili Salad Dressing (Makes 1 2/3 cups)

2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup salad oil
1 egg yolk
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of Cayenne
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 cup chili sauce
Put sweetened condensed milk, vinegar, salad oil, egg yolk, salt, Cayenne and mustard into mixing bowl. Beat with rotary egg beater until mixture is well blended and thickened. Add chili sauce and mix well. If thicker consistency is desired, chill before serving.

Grandmothers Club Increased by Six

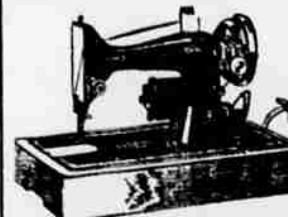
