

Stojack, Williams In Main Event

The two who currently are riding the best win-loss record in the state—Frankie Stojack and Al Williams—will clash in the main event Saturday night. Stojack, who is undefeated, last week Williams defeated George Dusette and Stojack held a coast junior-heavyweight title until a few short weeks ago.

Stojack, the winner of a main event battle will get a shot at the present champion—Jack McLoughlin of Canada.

Dusette will be on the program also. He meets Tony Ross in the semi-final. Ross will provide Dusette with just as stern opposition as did Williams. The Chicago villain has several years of professional boxing experience to match his wrestling lore and he generally falls back on his pugilistic knowledge when wrestling.

Dusette, though, is a fast, tricky campaigner and should stand a good chance against tough Tony. The two walloping wops, Ernie Piluso and Tony Falletti, will square away in the opener.

Piluso, a local restaurant-night club operator, will be the fans favorite against the rough villain from Hartford, Connecticut.

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Fraley Blasts Locke Expulsion From PGA Circuit

Claims PGA Has Been
Looking for Way Out

NEW YORK, July 29—(U.P.)—The Professional Golfers Association, torn by an internal battle for control and individual gain, is involved in another disgraceful case which illustrates fully to what a low level the dollar-hungry divot diggers have sunk.

This time it is the barring from U. S. P.G.A.-sponsored tournaments of Bobby Locke, the sharp-shooter from South Africa.

The reason given was that Locke, after winning the British Open, failed to return to play in the Inverness Invitational. The technical wording was that he "failed to honor his commitments."

Won Too Much
No matter what the P.G.A. brass hats charge in rebuttal, the truth is that Locke was cutting up too much of the booty and this, stiffened by animosity and jealousy, was an easy way out.

For if failing to live up to commitments was a valid reason to bar a player from P.G.A. events, three-quarters of our own professionals would have to go home and make a living giving lessons.

One of the nicest guys on the golf circuit is Jimmy Demaret. Maybe that's the reason he wasn't barred—although he didn't show up at St. Petersburg when he was the once-advised defending champion.

Similarly, the Canadian P.G.A. should immediately put the boot to Sam Snead, Cary Middlecoff and Lloyd Mangrum. They were billed to play in the Canadian Open—but didn't show. All the Canadians did was hold up the payoff to our P.G.A.

This is a particularly humorous reason given by our P.G.A. in barring Locke—and another blot on our sportsmanship—when you consider that just two months ago the P.G.A. didn't want anything to do with him.

That was when they held the P.G.A. championship at Richmond. Locke was barred as "no longer being a visitor."

And, coincidentally, as for barring those who don't keep commitments, Dutch Harris was the host club's "traveling pro," and he didn't show up for their own tournament. Yes, he was billed to play.

Now, if it was a case of Dutch being an expendable, why kick about Locke at Inverness? He was replaced by Sam Snead, the P.G.A. champion who previously was unavailable. Inverness got the best of the deal in the long run.

But for some strange reason, our P.G.A. decided—all of a sudden—that we couldn't do without Locke. Maybe it was because he just won the British Open.

But Bobby advising Inverness that he couldn't skip right back across the ocean and being well-substituted, preferred to do the gentlemanly thing and stay in Britain to give them a drawing card at their own tournaments. It was payment for their hospitality—and the only right thing to do in a country where the game is finding it a struggle to make a comeback.

Let's admit that Locke isn't the greatest hall fellow well met. Admit, too, that he isn't exactly a spendthrift and doesn't go out of his way to make everybody like him. But he was a guest here—and an unwanted one, at that, before winning the British Open.

Tommy Armour, a real gentleman, was one of the first to protest our action. And you'll find many of the home pros doing the same thing.

Our pros are slated to go to England in September for the Ryder Cup matches and four other tournaments. They won't stay out because Locke is in.

Meanwhile, the British P.G.A. is investigating. What they should do is call off the international matches and bar any and all of our players from competing there until we stop spelling the word sportsmanship with a dollar mark.

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MANAGING the Kansas City Monarchs is "Cool Papa" Bell, long-time teammate of the famous Satchel Paige. Bell's Monarchs will play the Eugene All-Stars in an exhibition game Monday night at 19th and Lawrence.

Pair Tied for Western Open Lead With 67's

Mangrum, Harbert
Upset Favorites

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 29—(U.P.)—Lloyd Mangrum and Chick Harbert, who don't believe in predictions, hoped to keep the lead Friday in the second 18-hole round of the \$15,000 Western Open golf tournament.

Dapper Mangrum of Chicago and Handsome Harbert of Detroit upset the pre-tournament favorites Thursday as they tied with first-round scores of 67, five under par, on the tough Keller course.

The favorites—Dr. Cary Middlecoff of Memphis and Sammy Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. V.—weren't far behind. Middlecoff was only one stroke off the pace with 68 and Snead was just a stroke behind him.

The field of 112 still in the running after Thursday's round will be cut to 60 after Friday. The survivors will play 18-hole rounds again Saturday and Sunday.

Harbert put the pressure on Mangrum when his 36-32-67 total was posted Thursday almost before Mangrum had teed off.

But the Chicagoan played steadily to cut a first-nine 34 and was coasting along at four under par going into the 400-yard, par 4 17th hole. Then he got into trouble. His second shot was short of the green and his third landed eight feet from the cup. His putt rimmed the cup and he had to settle for a bogie five.

Needing an eagle on the 18th to tie, Mangrum teed off with more than 3,000 spectators watching and a rainstorm threatening. His drive was sure and his approach dropped 15 feet from the pin. Mangrum calmly ramed home the payoff putt.

Middlecoff shared his 68 with Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., Bill Kaiser, Louisville, Ky., Jimmy Thomson, New York City, and newcomer Ted Neist, of Walla Walla, Wash.

Snead's companions at 69 were the first-day amateur leader, Al Bessellink of Niles, Ill., and professionals Tony Holguin, Mexican Open champ from Onadajajara, Ky. LaFoon, West Chicago, E. J. "Dutch" Harrison, St. Andrews, Ill., and Fred Hawkins, Antioch, Ill.

Bunched at 70 were Tony Penna of Cincinnati, Chandler Harper of Portsmouth, Va., Ellsworth Vines of Iowa City, Iowa, and George Schwiter, Salt Lake City.

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Laurelwood Medalist Tourney Due Sunday

Plans for Laurelwood Golf Club's summer championship tournament have been outlined by tournament chairman George Lynch, and first action has been set for Sunday.

Lynch said that the club championship trophy will be on a handicap basis with three levels, and four trophies are to be presented.

The first will be Sunday when 18 holes will be played to determine medalist. The medalist trophy will be presented to the player with the best net score after Sunday's round.

Club members will then enter 36 holes of medal play on August 7 and 14 on three handicap levels. Scratch players to five handicappers will shoot for the club championship, 5 to 10 handicap players will try for the low handicap championship, and players from 10 handicap and up will play for the high handicap summer championship.
