

Morse Suggests Refresher Course

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A Republican senator thinks members of Congress need "a refresher course on their lesson of last November."

Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), said that "Congress is out of step with the people."

"They are way ahead of us—much more liberal," he said. "Congress needs to get back and listen to them."

To that end, Morse said, he and 15 other Republicans are backing a proposal that Congress go home Aug. 20.

Then Come Back

"Then, I think the Republicans should let the Democratic leadership know that we will cooperate to come back in special session Nov. 15, if necessary," Morse said.

He told a reporter that chairman Eugene Millikin has agreed to call a meeting of his Senate Republican Policy committee early next week to permit Morse to explain his program to his GOP colleagues.

Morse said that, in addition to the 15 Republican backers of his idea, some Democrats think it has merit.

Wouldn't Harm

"Not officially, of course," he said. "But there are those liberal Democratic senators who feel it wouldn't do some of their colleagues any harm to get back to their people."

Morse's proposal would mean putting Congress into high gear for nearly four weeks to act on appropriation bills, reciprocal trade extension legislation, a European arms program and a minimum wage program.

Other Issues Then

"Then, if we came back in special session, would be the time to consider aid to education, labor legislation, a new tax program, a domestic economic program in case of recession and a realigned foreign relations program taking into consideration aid to Asia," Morse said.

He said the Democrats' legislative schedule was based on "political pressure through fatigue."

"We younger members of Congress can last until the snow flies," Morse said, "but in the interests of the country and others here we think a recess and return to the people is in order."

Moscow Radio Programs Blast Justice Douglas

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Moscow is directing a stream of its choicest epithets at associate supreme court justice William O. Douglas for his vacation visit to Iran.

A Moscow radio broadcast to Iran recorded Friday by American official monitors referred to Douglas as an "arrogant speculator" who was accompanied by spies on a mountain climbing jaunt near the Soviet border.

Son With Him

Douglas, accompanied by his son, left in June on a summer tour of Iran and other Middle East areas. He announced in advance he planned to climb peaks in Azerbaijan, close to the Russian frontier. Moscow immediately voiced suspicion but did not really warm up to the subject until the latest broadcast to the Iranians in the Persian language.

Douglas, said Moscow, was accompanied by a "dozen devils" that is, 13 Americans, who were really United States Army officers who were disguised in mountaineering outfits.

Wendling's Pool Not Pure Enough for Class In Red Cross Swimming
