

Wiel Accused Filching US Know-How

WASHINGTON (AP)—American industrial know-how "worth millions of dollars," has been stolen by Soviet spies in the last year, a Senate judiciary subcommittee was told.

Witness was J. Anthony Brown, president of the American Institute of Foreign Trade, a Senate judiciary subcommittee was told.

He described the institute as an organization that administers American exports and imports.

He said he came to the institute in 1910, and that he has been with it since. He said it has been the "center of the Soviet espionage system in America."

Active Clubbers Donate Funds To Build New Hospital School

The children's hospital school was richer by \$2433.32 Friday, and that much closer to a new building in the Dunn School area, after Lloyd Eppenbaugh, manager of the school, received a check for that amount from the Eugene Active Club. The check represented the "take minus expenses" at the club's fireworks demonstration at the fairgrounds July 4th.

At the same meeting Clifford Johnson received a \$309.75 check for use by the Lane County Lookouts. This money was gathered by the club from an auction.

Andy Maxon, chairman of the club committee which staged the fireworks demonstration, told the club that the show will probably become an annual event.

Eppenbaugh praised the club for demonstrating the "ability to sweat" for a worthy cause. He reported \$25,000 in the school's building fund, and estimated that \$200,000 would be needed for initial construction of the hospital school, which will have room for 80 dormitory students and 50 non-residents.

"Without community support such as your club has demonstrated," Eppenbaugh said, "the project would likely have floundered long ago."

"But thanks to strong support the project is now on a firm footing," he said.

He said supporters of the school would conduct a concentrated drive for funds, and that they hoped to begin construction in the fall of 1950.

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Editors Decry Political Plums For Newsmen

NEW YORK (AP)—The American Society of Newspaper Editors has condemned the acceptance of paid political jobs by newspapermen who perform no legitimate work to earn the money.

The ASNE board of directors reports that a full investigation has shown such unethical practices did exist among a small number of Illinois newspapermen from 1941 to 1949 under the administration of ex-Gov. Dwight Green, a Republican.

The ASNE report found that the three major press associations had used "faulty news judgment" but were not guilty of any "considered attempt to suppress the news" of the situation in Illinois after the Chicago Daily News and the St. Louis Post-Dispatch ran their expose stories beginning April 14, 1949.

A long-standing political custom under both Democratic and Republican administrations explained, in part, the fact that some newspaper publishers and their employees in Illinois were rewarded with jobs on the state payroll involving little or no service to the public, the report said.

The report was approved unanimously by the board of directors and issued from the office of ASNE President B. M. McKelway, editor of the Washington (D.C.) Star.

After the Daily News and the Post-Dispatch reported that 51 newspapermen were on the payroll of the state of Illinois, and ASNE appointed an investigating committee composed of Jenkin Lloyd Jones, editor of the Tulsa, Okla., Tribune, and a member of the board of directors of ASNE; A. Y. Aronson, managing editor of the Louisville, Ky., Times, and John W. Hillman, editorial director of the Indianapolis News.

The committee found that fewer than 50 of Illinois' 832 newspapers were involved. Most of the papers involved "were of that class so small and so weak economically as to depend on public printing or other forms of political subsidy or patronage for existence."

The Daily News and the Post-Dispatch were commended for their work in exposing the situation.

Noting that there had been suggestions of a conspiracy among the press to rush up the story, the report found that regional dekamens on the press association had used faulty news judgment in failing to put the Illinois story on their national wires immediately.

Travel Deaths Lower in '48

CHICAGO (AP)—The National Safety Council reports that all forms of travel were safer in 1948 than during the previous 10 years. The council said that the combined accidental death rate last year was 1.8 for every 100,000,000 passenger miles, the lowest in the 10 years that records have been kept.

All major forms of transportation, including passenger cars, taxis, buses, railroads and airlines, improved their standing, the council said, but scheduled air transport planes showed the greatest improvement in 1948 over 1947.

Scheduled air transport accidents took 83 lives last year for a passenger-mile death rate of 1.3. Passenger railroads had the lowest death rate, 1.3, representing a total of 32 fatalities last year. The rate for buses was .18 although deaths totaled 120.

The council said that cars and taxis were responsible for 15,200 deaths, but the death rate was 2.1. The vehicles traveled 710,000,000 miles in 1948, the council said.

Surviving are her widower, Cecil L.; her mother, a brother, a daughter and several grandchildren. Services will be at Rigdon mortuary in Salem.

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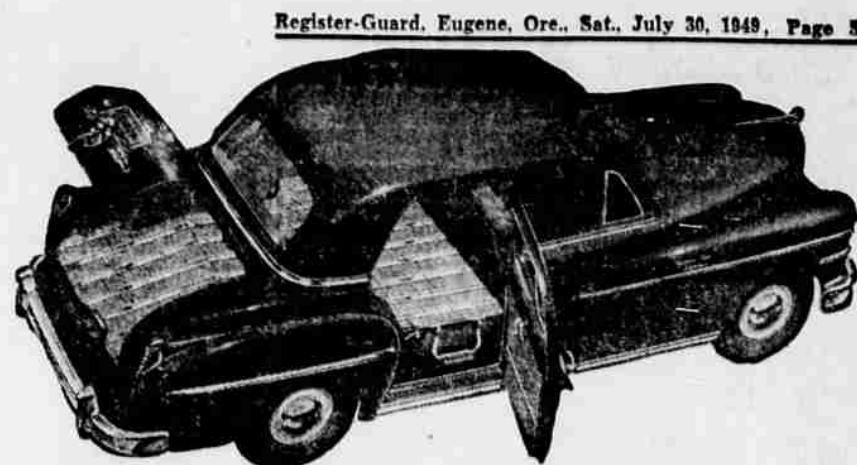

Ann Boettiger Presses Divorce

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Attorneys for Anna Roosevelt Boettiger, daughter of the late President Franklin Roosevelt, have filed an affidavit contending failure of her estranged husband, John Boettiger, to reply to her divorce cross-complaint.

Mrs. Boettiger's attorney, George Reed Carlock, said failure to answer his wife's cross-complaint charging desertion within the 20 days specified by law places Boettiger's suit in default.

Superior Judge Renz L. Jennings has scheduled a default hearing for 9 a. m. Monday. Ruling in favor of Mrs. Boettiger is tantamount to granting her the divorce.

Boettiger filed the original suit charging his wife with extreme mental cruelty. She answered two days later with the cross-complaint and, in turn, Boettiger was required to file an answer to her brief.

The Boettigers were married in 1935 after the President's daughter met the newsmen while he was a White House reporter for the Chicago Tribune.

Agency Compares Negro, White Schools

WASHINGTON (AP)—In states with segregated schools, white children get an education almost twice as expensive as that for negroes, the Office of Education reports.

The agency released a study of 1945-46 enrollments in the 17 states and the District of Columbia, where segregation of white and negro pupils is practiced.

It said the average expense for each white pupil in daily attendance was \$104.66 a year, and each negro pupil, \$57.57.
