

Home Owners Repair Job

Expenditures on Lane county homes will total \$2,500,000, according to a report just made by the Title Council of Oregon.

Every trade in the county will benefit this year from the repair expenditures, which will serve as an incentive in keeping both the residential and commercial building trades busy throughout the year.

Replacement of equipment will take about \$1,000,000, according to the report.

Production of such materials as finished hardwood flooring, clay tile for baths and kitchens, and cement reached all-time highs in 1948, and 1949 output of products for construction promises to be more than ample for both home building and repair, Wintersgill declared.

Most materials are available today in a much wider range than at any time since the war, he pointed out. Clay tile manufacturers, for instance, have added scores of new hues to color lines in recent months, he said.

Expenditures throughout the United States on home repairs will total between \$2,500,000,000 and \$3,100,000,000 in 1949, the Title Council estimated.

Plumbing Repairs
Installation of showers, tiling of bathrooms and replacement of plumbing will require approximately \$7 of the theoretic \$100, and carpentry work will account for \$5. Repairs with stone, glass and tile, and Miscellaneous work, will take the balance of the \$100, according to the report.

Science Finds Cycle Riding Aids the Deaf

Dr. Christian A. Volf, Danish-born physicist, made the statement recently that daily bicycling may relieve nerve deafness. Dr. Volf, who has just received the annual award of the Museum of Science and Industry for his work with acoustics, said that he had conducted successful bicycle-riding experiments with 25 hard-of-hearing persons over a period of several months.

Explanation of the favorable results "lies undoubtedly in the improvement of equilibrium centers and subsequent lateralization of bone conduction," the physicist said.

Dr. Volf said he hit upon bicycling as a promising exercise in equilibrium after being impressed by the low incidence of nerve deafness among the bike-riding people of Denmark.

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Four-H Kids From Counties To Take Livestock Tour

Four-H boys and girls from Lane County, along with those from Linn, Lincoln, Polk and Benton have been invited to attend the South Willamette Valley 4-H livestock and crops tour Aug. 1-3.

The cost of the tour will be \$3.50 and the sum may either be left at the county extension office or paid at the time of arrival at the assembly point.

Monday the group will arrive at 10 a. m. at the Prairie Bloom guernsey farm, two miles south of Junction City for a demonstration of fitting, showing and judging of guernsey cattle.

In the afternoon they will see fitting, showing and judging of swine, beef and sheep at the McNeal farm. That afternoon they will also swim and play softball at Benton-Lane Park.

The youngsters will take sleeping bags and the tour will be organized in much the same way as a summer camp.

Tuesday morning the group will visit the Walter Hubbard Farm to see purebred Hereford cattle and registered Suffolk and Hampshire sheep.

Also Tuesday morning they will visit Grimes Bros. dairy farm at Harrisburg for judging of Holstein cattle, the work to be conducted by Edgar and Randall Grimes.

A visit to the Hubert Willoughby farm is planned for the afternoon, illustrating operation of fattening beef cattle on pasture and grain, and work on irrigated pasture. The group will then visit the Jenks poultry hatchery and then return to Benton-Lane Park.

Amethyst Runs Red Blockade

LONDON, (AP)—The British sloop Amethyst ran a gauntlet of Chinese Communist shore batteries down the Yangtze River Saturday and has rejoined the fleet, the Admiralty announced.

An Admiralty bulletin said it had received a signal from the Amethyst which said: "Rejoined the fleet. No damage or casualties. God save the King."

The Amethyst was fired on at least twice in her down river run to safety, the admiralty said. The Amethyst has been at anchor in the Yangtze River since last April 20, when she was shelled by Chinese Communist shore batteries and ran aground on Rose Island, 60 miles downstream from Nanking.

This was before the fall of Nanking to the Communists. At that time British casualties aboard the 1,490 ton Amethyst included 17 dead and 29 wounded. Normally the Amethyst carries 192 men but only 86 were aboard when the sloop made its dash to freedom.

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
