

Yard Candidate Wins Election

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va.—(AP)—Quietly, the 35-year-old Charlotteville, Va., captured the party nomination for governor in November. The election was a surprise to many, as the candidate was not widely known. He won by a narrow margin, defeating several other candidates. The election was held on a rainy day, and the turnout was low. The candidate's victory was a significant upset in the state's political history.

Youth Awakens After 26 'Pills'

OMAHA, Neb.—(AP)—A seven-year-old boy, unconscious and near death, was revived after 26 hours after swallowing 334 grains of sedative, a doctor said Wednesday. The boy, Travis Wissenburg, was found by his mother in a rooming house. He had been given the pills by a woman who claimed to be his mother. The boy is now recovering in a hospital. The incident has raised concerns about the misuse of sedatives.

Atomic Appropriation Recommended by Senate

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate recommended the atomic energy appropriation Wednesday to support the commission from the National Atomic Energy Commission. The appropriation is for the construction of a new atomic reactor plant. The Senate's action was a key step in the funding of the atomic energy program. The commission has been working on the project for some time, and the funding will allow it to move forward.

Choco Fire Checked

PRINEVILLE, Ore.—(AP)—Loggers' firemen brought a timber fire under control Wednesday. The fire started in a wooded area and threatened nearby buildings. The firemen worked for several hours to contain the fire, and it was eventually extinguished. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. The fire department is praising the efforts of the loggers' firemen.

Harvest Starts

WACARUS, Ore.—(AP)—Harvesting of the Rogue River Valley pear crop got underway this week. The crop is expected to be a good one, and the harvest will continue for several weeks. The pears are being sold at a premium price, and the growers are pleased with the results.

Seed Crop Forecast

PORTLAND—(AP)—Seed producers have revised rye grass seed crop predictions for Oregon upward by 10 million pounds. A survey indicated a harvest of more than 40 million pounds. This compares with an earlier prediction of 30 million pounds and last year's total harvest of 27 million pounds. Linn County growers, who produce much of the crop, credited favorable weather plus extensive use of chemical fertilizer and weed killers. They said the application of the weed and fertilizer chemicals helped the crop recover from a hard winter. Market sources said producer prices were 9 1/4 to 9 3/4 cents a pound.

Construction Starts On Auxiliary Gym

Construction will begin Wednesday on an auxiliary gymnasium behind Eugene High School, according to L. L. Erdmann, assistant superintendent in charge of physical properties for School District No. 4. Footings have already been poured for the 45-foot by 80-foot structure. Maintenance men for the school district have done most of the work; and Timber Structures, Inc., will construct trusses. The building will be used for a temporary gymnasium until the new EHS is built and will then be used for either a playshed or gym, according to Erdmann.

Fuel bids are now being called by Tom Powers, superintendent of Bethel School District No. 52. Bids are asked on 800 barrels of crude fuel oil No. 5 or P.S. This week 100 employees struck in a pay dispute. The strikers were led by Henry Romiguere, business agent of the Cleaning and Dye House Workers' Union, Local 7.

Old Landmark May Be Park

OAK HARBOR, Wash.—(AP)—Old Fort Townsend, which was established in 1856 to offer protection from the Tillamook Indians, is being surveyed as a possible Washington state park. State Parks Commissioner John Vanderriche said there were still some legal obstacles to be overcome, but that the purchase price would be only "one dollar."

A fireboat doused the girders with cool water, and the span was then closed.
