

Air Force Reserve Center in Medford

Medford has been designated as headquarters for a Volunteer Air Reserve Training Group that covers virtually all of western, southern and central Oregon under a revamping of the entire Air Force reserve program, the Associated Press has announced.

Eugene will play a vital role in the shake-up, with its newly formed 9416th Squadron. Commander of the squadron is Lt. Col. Arthur H. Delmore, 144 Knop Lane.

Has Six Squadrons

Six squadrons make up the V.A.R. Group, and flights from the squadrons are located in 17 Oregon cities.

The new Group, the 9091st is composed of thousands of officers and men, the announcement said, from all counties in the state with the exception of those bordering on the Columbia River and the state of Idaho.

Commanding officer of the unit is Col. Elmer H. Stambaugh, Gold Hill, USAFR (Ret.).

Other squadrons include 9412th, Bend; 9413th, Corvallis; 9414th, Salem; 9415th, Coos Bay; and 9417th, Medford.

Other squadron commanders are Maj. Albert T. Lassen, Bend; Lt. Col. John H. Reardon, Corval-

lis; Lt. Col. Robert C. Irwin, Salem; Maj. Robert D. Shaw, Coos Bay; and Maj. John H. Enders, Medford.

Flights in Many Cities

Flights from the 6 squadrons are located in Redmond, Burns, Bend, Salem, McMinville, Albany, Corvallis, Newport, Cottage Grove, North Bend, Coos Bay, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Medford, and Eugene.

In a statement issued Friday, Lt. Col. Delmore said, "It is essential that all Air Reservists check their status immediately. There are about 500 reservists in this area, composing all personnel categories."

"As we are entirely volunteers, there are not even funds allotted to us for postage stamps to send mailing notices to our members. We are relying on the local press and radio to help us."

Studied New Set-Up

Eugene's squadron commander spent two weeks' active duty in June at McChord Field, Wash., studying the new reserve set-up.

The next meeting of the local Air Reservists will be Aug. 11 at 1450 12th Ave. W. in the quonset huts. The commander has requested that all reservists attend.

University Gets BPA Projects

The first social science research projects ever granted by the Bonneville Power Administration have been awarded to the University of Oregon, according to Eldon L. Johnson, dean of the college of liberal arts and graduate school.

Two contracts have been awarded. The first allows a grant for a study of local government administration. Specifically, it concerns municipal corporations engaged in public distribution of Columbia River power.

The second contract provides for an allotment on a project not yet decided upon. It will be selected according to special interests of the research staffs.

Pending approval by the state Board of Higher Education, the studies will be undertaken by Dr. E. S. Wengert, head of the political science department, and Herman Kehrl, director, bureau of municipal research and associate professor of political science.

Land Viewed

While the Jacoby trial was in progress, Chief Judge James Alger Fee sent a third jury out to view the land of Leigh S. Crawford, Dexter. The Crawford condemnation proceedings were to begin Friday morning.

Scheduled for trial as soon as the jury retires to decide what the government must pay Crawford, will be the action to condemn the land of Theo. C. Erickson.

Erickson, who chose not to be represented by counsel, will try his own case in an effort to get more for 1.42 acres of his Pleasant Hill farm than the (\$280) government offered.

Satisfied with Jury

Thursday afternoon, Erickson said he was satisfied with the jury after it had been examined by the court. Neither side exercised its right to challenge, and the case was set for 2 p.m. Friday. The jury went out to look at the land Thursday afternoon.

Judge Fee, who keeps at least two juries busy most of the time, always had another case ready for hearing. While one jury was in court trying a case, another would be out looking at the land involved in the next.

Court Staff Told

In addition to the judge and United States attorneys, the court is staffed by Hal S. Kenyon, Clerk, Jack Caulfield, Marshall, Al Price, crier and bailiff, John Beckwith, reporter, Vern Bishop, deputy clerk, Paul Hanlon and George Vranizan, deputy marshals, and Marguerite Pendergrass, secretary to the judge.

Beside the two cases completed and the two now in progress, there remain three more for trial, all involving the condemnation of land for the relocation of the Meridian Dam.

Neal George, Eagle secretary, said Wednesday the new unit took the name "McKenzie" because its membership covered a larger area than just inside the city limits. George said the McKenzie aerie was assisted greatly in its initiation ceremony recently by representatives of the Eugene aerie.

Forest Advisors Now Formed

Director J. A. Hall, Pacific Northwest forest and range experiment station, has announced formation of the station's new forest fire research advisory committee.

The new committee, composed of state, private and federal foresters, will review periodically the status and problems of forest fire control in the Pacific Northwest region so that plans for forest fire control will meet existing needs and that selection of priorities for the research program is sound.

Similar regional advisory committees are planned for other parts of the West—as well as an all-western forest fire control and research committee comprised of members selected from the several regional committees, according to Hall.

Cat-Driver Hurt In Alpine Woods

Clarence E. Gersberger, 41, of Monroe, was taken to the Eugene Hospital Friday morning by Valley Ambulance following a logging accident at Alpine, north of Monroe. The accident occurred about 9 a.m.

The hospital was unable to report on his condition, but the ambulance driver said that Gersberger was operating a "cat" near a log-falling area when a log fell on the canopy and he was crushed beneath it. He escaped with shoulder and neck injuries, according to the driver. Gersberger is an employe of the Swalley Logging Co., of Springfield.
