

# Local Prep Gridders in All-Star Classic

PORTLAND—(Special)—Bob Schmitt and 24 other players selected to the Oregon All-Star roster when they assemble here August 14 to begin two weeks of intensive practice sessions.

The annual Shrine game, which is destined to become Oregon's most celebrated sports attraction, got off to a flying start last fall with a wide-open thriller. A closer but equally as thrilling game is anticipated this year, with the Portland team coming from one of the strongest prep circuits in Rose City history.

The game, which will launch Oregon's 1949 football season is actually a collegiate grid preview, for many of the players in last year's inaugural are already listed as regulars on college teams for this fall's campaign.

In addition to the football game another dazzling pregame pageant is set for presentation to the public with some colorful half-time entertainment.

Net proceeds from the game go to the Northwest unit of the Shriner's Hospital for Crippled Children. Tickets have been going fast and a sell-out crowd of 30,000 is expected to view the tilt. Reserved seats are priced at \$3 and advance reservations can be obtained through Shrine game headquarters in Parlor B of the Portland Hotel.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Five of Notre Dame's 10 football games this fall are sold out—more than seven weeks before the season starts.

Ticket Manager M. Robert Cahill reported Thursday he didn't have a single pastboard left for the Tulane game Oct. 15 or the Southern California classic Nov. 26. Both will be played here. He added that he was four days behind in opening his mail.

Sellouts had been reported previously for Irish games at the University of Washington, Oct. 1; at Michigan State, Nov. 5, and at Southern Methodist, Dec. 3.

Cahill said the early rush for tickets was the heaviest he ever saw.

## Stanford May Televis Fall Gridiron Games

STANFORD, Cal., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Stanford University is negotiating to televise its football games this fall, Al Masters, Director of Athletics, said Thursday.

"However, we haven't any concrete offer and nothing has been signed as yet," Masters said. "It would be strictly an experimental set-up. I understand there are only 9,000 television sets in the Bay Area and we are not afraid of hurting attendance."

## Yanks May Get First Negro Ace

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Although it's a little early to tell, Outfielder Bob Thurman of the Newark Bears could be the first Negro to wear the uniform of the New York Yankees.

Thurman, a long-bail-hitting left-handed swinger, has been with the Bears for only seven games, but his thumping during that time has been something to see.

Purchased from the Kansas City Monarchs to give the cello-dwelling Bears a boost on the field and at the box, Thurman may go on to be the first of his race to become a Yankee.

If he should be promoted, it would mean that all of the New York teams—Yanks, Giants and Dodgers—would have Negro players. Jackie Robinson, of course, broke in with Brooklyn, and later was joined on the "Bum" squad by Roy Campanella and Don Newcombe. About a month ago, the Giants added Henry Thompson and Monte Irvin to their roster.

Thurman made a sensational debut with the Bears, whaling a tremendous home run high over the centerfield wall, 415 feet away. Only one other player, the powerfully built Dale Alexander, had ever cleared that distant barrier in a league game.

In his seven games in the class AAA International League, Thurman has banged out 10 hits in 27 times at bat, including a double as well as the three homers. He has scored eight runs and batted in nine more.

## Three Players Clout Homers in Every Park

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(AP)—With the season two-thirds gone, three players—Hank Sauer of Chicago, Duke Snider of Brooklyn and Ed Robinson of Washington—have hit home runs in all eight parks in which they've played.

Four others—Ralph Kiner, Bill Nicholson, Vern Stephens and Clyde Vollmer—need only a homer in one more park to complete the cycle.

Sauer, clouting outfielder of the Cubs, became the first to accomplish the feat when he cleared the wall in Philadelphia's Shibe Park on July 20. Robinson completed the circuit four days later with a drive over the right field fence in Cleveland. Snider made the rounds in Pittsburgh Aug. 1.

During the past 15 years only 36 players in both leagues have been able to clear the wall in all parks in a single season. Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox and Jimmy Fox, former Philadelphia and Boston slugger, have done it the most times, four.
