Ground Is Broken for Start of New Catholic High School Work

Work was begun this week on the new Catholic High School, which will be located on a six-acre tract adjoining the south side of the new Eugene High School. The new building will be designed by architect Graham Plater and will be constructed of reinforced concrete with a simple modern design. The contract cost of the building is \$202,000, exclusive of equipment and necessary developments. Stien Bros. are the general contractors. The building program is under the direction of the Rev. Francis P. Leipzig, pastor of St. Mary's Church, assisted by a committee including St. Mary's Catholic men: Gus Eberdt, George J. W. Kennedy, George Ed Phillips, Gale Roberts, O. Russell, B. H. Saal and Adam Wilhelm. Efficient property surrounds the school to provide ample playground space, and a building will be west of the school, facing south on Eighteenth Avenue. In addition to six classrooms, the school provides a library, science, administrative offices, gymnasium with complete facilities and provisions for future addition of a stage. Growth of the new parochial school indicates the rapid growth of the Eugene parish, according to the Rev. Francis P. Leipzig who has been pastor and administrator for the past 21 years. The time of his arrival here in 1928, parish grade and high school were both accommodated in a wooden building, still in use on Lincoln Street between 14th and Eleventh Avenues. Today, in the twelve grades of the school, 250 pupils, taught by a faculty of seven. Enrollment last year was 732, and is expected to reach 750 this year.
