Wins His Own Case in Court

The case was one of the shortest to be heard in the federal court, the entire proceedings taking less than an hour. Each side had but one witness, and the jury merely had to decide what was the fair market value of the land, excluding any speculative damages.

The jury was out about a half-hour, and reported back a verdict based on Erickson's low appraisal of \$350 an acre.

Other Case Is Decided
Early in the afternoon, another federal court jury found the reasonable value of 6.29 acres taken from Gaiety E. Jacoby, Pleasant Hill, to be worth \$13,000.

The government figures submitted to the jury were about \$7000, and estimates given by witnesses for Jacoby were about \$24,000.

One of Jacoby's principal contentions was that the government ought to pay a market price for the 6.29 acres taken and substantial damages because the new railroad track would be right in front of his farm house.

The Jacoby case had been tried last year when the federal court met in the Moore Hall, but was set for new trial because of technical difficulties.

Recess Until Monday
Judge James Alger Fee recessed the court until Monday and docketed the case of the United States v. Elmer C. Olsen and Dorothy L. Olsen.

The Olsen land, being taken for railroad purposes, consists of some 4.7 acres near Dexter.

Putting Out Fire Brings Free Movie

SPRINGFIELD — A freckled 13-year old boy Friday prevented what could have been an extremely dangerous grass fire.

Walter Summers, 1311 F. St., spotted clumps of dry grass burning along Southern Pacific railroad tracks 100 yards South of where the tracks cross Main St. The quick-thinking youth spotted the blaze, he said, while riding on his bicycle.

Summers jumped off the vehicle, ran to the scene, and extinguished the small fire with his feet before it could spread. Several buildings were in the immediate area.

decision has been made on making it a party issue.

Considers White Paper
Vandenberg said the 1,054-page white paper defies quick digestion.

"Some general conclusions, however, seem reasonably obvious," he said. "The Nationalist Government in China, particularly in its failure to clean its own house, has made tragic mistakes—although Chiang Kai-Shek's magnificent and unforgettable defense of the allied cause in the Jap war is not among them."

"The American government also has made tragic, however well-meaning, mistakes—although a lack of great military and material aid is not among them."

Vandenberg listed as this nation's "chief" errors:

1. "The price we paid" at China's expense at the war time Tehran and Yalta conferences for Russia's "belated and unnecessary" entry into the Far Eastern War.

2. "Our well intentioned but impractical insistence" upon a coalition of the Nationalist government with Communists.

He declared that the United States cannot "acquiesce in the results of aggression." As Secretary of State Dean Acheson did Friday, Vandenberg said he did not believe the Communists in China could succeed permanently.

It was made known that the senator believes both Chiang's "bitter-end" backers in Congress and those strongly supporting state department policy must give ground.

Vandenberg believes that only through a comprehensive study, such as that already under way by a special committee headed by Philip C. Jessup, can the ground work for a new American Far Eastern policy be laid.

Oregana Ready To Go in Mail

est service employee at the near-by Canyon Ferry ranger station. To the southeast, 200 firefighters brought flames under control in the Bull Run Gulch area near York, after more than 2000 acres were burned over. Moir said these men will hold their lines unless a high wind comes up.

A mid-afternoon thunderstorm sprinkled only a few drops of water on the men fighting the larger fire, but it did knock the mercury down from a sizzling 101 degrees in the steep canyons.

The wind gusts which came with the storm enabled the fire to outrun the men. Flames cracked through timbered gulches, moved rapidly along a front which built up tremendous heat and pressure. They leaped great distances as trees literally exploded.

Indian Reserve Burns
Thousands of other acres were ravaged meanwhile by fire in Washington.

Crews brought a 10,000-acre blaze under control at least temporarily Saturday on the Colville Indian Reservation in northwest Washington.

Indian service crews and Biles-Coleman Lumber Company workers battled the flames throughout the night, and saved the reservation mission by back-fire. About 100 men were fighting the remaining flames Saturday.

Lightning started the blaze five days ago. Since then, it has swept over forest lands slashings including those owned by Biles-Coleman Company.

E. A. Hall, forestry aide of the Indian service, said the high temperatures in the area could mean more fire trouble. A logging company official said a high wind could whip the blaze again out of control.
