

Council to Receive Bids on Millrace

Grid Questionnaire To Have Consideration

Bids on work to restore the Millrace and on several street and sewer projects will be presented to the Eugene city council Monday night.

Other matters scheduled to come before the council at its 7:30 p.m. meeting in the city hall council chambers will include several communications pertaining to the downtown grid system of one-way streets.

The bids for the Millrace work—construction of a small dam and canal to restore a flow of water in the channel from the Willamette River near Judkins Point—were opened Thursday. Low bidder for the job, at \$11,565, was the F. W. Riddle Construction Co.

Paving Bids Opened
If a contract for the Millrace restoration is awarded by the council upon this bid, completion is to be accomplished within 30 days according to the bid.

Bids were opened Friday in the office of the city manager and tabulated for presentation to council for possible contract awards relating to:

1. Paving of Pearl St., from 16th to 19th; low bid for asphalt concrete, Central Heating Co., \$10,432.57; low bid for 7-inch concrete, Nels T. Jorgensen, \$14,104.

2. Paving of Oak St., from 11th to 19th; low bid for asphalt concrete, Central Heating Co., \$12,187.18; low bid for 7-inch concrete, Nels T. Jorgensen, \$16,454.25.

3. Paving of Friendly St., from 18th to 19th; low bid for asphalt concrete, Central Heating Co., \$14,776.97; low bid for 7-inch concrete, Nels T. Jorgensen, \$20,711.

4. Paving of Potter St., from 25th to 26th; low bid for asphalt concrete, Central Heating Co., \$7,472.84; low bid for concrete, Nels T. Jorgensen, \$9,953.

5. Storm sewer in the alley between Onyx and Emerald, 25th and 26th; low bid, T. C. Wildish, \$2,499.10.

6. Sanitary sewer on High St., from 24th to 26th, on 26th from High to Ferry, on Ferry from 26th to 28th, on 28th from Ferry to Mill, on Ferry from 28th to 30th, on 30th from Ferry to Clifford, on Clifford to alley between 34th and 35th, and in this alley from Clifford to alley west of Donald. Low bid for this project, F. W. Riddle, \$40,148.80.

7. Storm sewer on 19th from the Amazon to alley west of Hilyard, in this alley from 19th to 22nd, and on 20th, 21st, and 22nd from the alley west of Hilyard to Harris. Low bid on this project, Intercity Sand and Gravel Co., \$29,382.59.

The sanitary sewer project (No. 6, above) will provide an initial trunk line into the South Willamette District. This area voted to be annexed to the city to gain the particular advantage of a sewer system. However, until a state supreme court decision last month ruled out a suit contesting the annexation, the city has been unable to proceed with plans for trunk line extensions into the district.

The request was made to the Portland district of the Corps of U. S. Army Engineers in a petition signed by 59 members of the association. Petitions were circulated at a reunion of the clan in July.

The area, which is being developed by the engineers, is on the Yacht Club road. It lies on a part of the land claim of Benjamin Richardson, a pioneer of 1846.

Cheaper Chops Expected in Fall

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Agriculture Department advised housewives Saturday cheaper pork chops are in prospect this fall. It also forecast generally lower prices for other meats resulting from increased supplies.

The department said meat and livestock prices are expected to remain generally steady until fall marketings begin. The large spring pig crop will then become available.

The department said meat supplies will increase some time in August or early September, as is normal for the season. Until that time, output of meat will be seasonally low, as slaughter of grain-fed cattle and hogs decreases.

Slaughter of cattle marketed off grass is increasing seasonally, but probably will total less than a year ago, the department said.

Postal Employees May Get Raise

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Postoffice and Civil Service Committee has unanimously approved legislation giving a \$150 a year pay increase to all postal employees.

The raise would include postmasters except fourth class postmasters who would get a five per cent increase.

The measure also, for the first time, would provide \$100 a year uniform allowance for employees required to wear uniforms. Annual sick leave would be increased from 15 to 20 days.

SP Revises Train Times

With inauguration of the new Shasta Daylight, the Southern Pacific has revised its train schedules between Portland and central and southern Oregon points.

Train 20, the Klamath, now leaves Eugene at 4:20 p.m. and arrives Portland at 8 p.m.

With the announcement came a simultaneous release from the Northern Pacific Railway that effective August 7 their new streamlined North Coast Limited will leave Portland at 9 p.m. for the east. This will afford southern and central Oregon travelers a connection to Montana and North Dakota cities, to Minneapolis, St. Paul, Chicago and other destinations.

Travelers returning from the North Coast Limited will arrive in Portland at 7:15 a.m. and will be able to make a connection with the new Daylight leaving Portland at 7:45 a.m. for Oregon and California points.

Posse members from all counties in the state will attend.

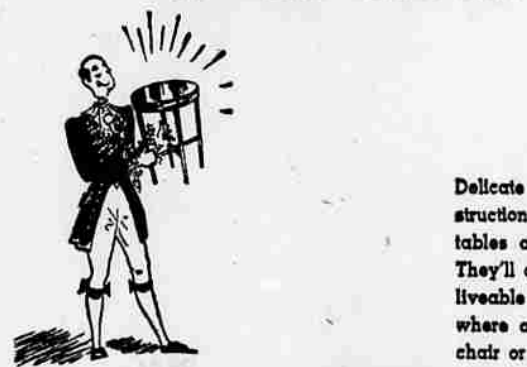
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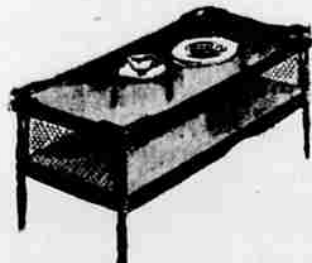


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
