Seattle Man Seeks Money Lost in Crash

SEATTLE—(AP)—An occupant of one of the homes destroyed July 17 in the crash of an Air Transport Associates, Inc., plane has sued in superior court to recover money he said was lost in the wreckage.

George A. Cordas said the money included \$1,870 in silver dollars, \$650 in half-dollars, \$694 in one roll of paper money, \$500 in another and \$1,250 in a third; \$200 in Canadian bills, 300 pounds in English paper money and 600 pounds in one roll of Australian, New Zealand and English money.

Police Chief George D. Eastman said the department is holding an undetermined amount of money recovered at the crash scene.

Lumberman to Discuss Timber Access Roads

Independent loggers and lumbermen of Lane County will meet Tuesday evening at the Osborne Hotel to hear Willamette and Siuslaw Forest supervisors and their staffs discuss the present and future of timber access roads.

Frank McCullough, chairman of the Lane Section of Western Forest Industries Assn., has announced the banquet meeting for 6:45 p. m. at the hotel. All persons in the lumber industry have been invited to attend.

Forest Service representatives, including J. R. Bruckart, supervisor of Willamette Forest, and Frederick M. Furst, Siuslaw Forest supervisor, will address the group. Maps showing present timber access roads will be shown and methods and plans for future road developments will be discussed.

Thieves Wreck Eugene House

A burglary at the home of Willis H. Small, 2287 MacMillan St., resulted in an estimated \$1500 damage to the house and furniture, and the thieves got away with only \$1.00 in small change early Saturday night, police reported Monday.

The burglars broke a garage window and entered the side door while Small was away, city police said. Once inside, they ransacked the house from top to bottom. The refrigerator was opened and food strewn about, half eaten. Three dozen eggs were smashed over the top of the dining room table and spread over an imported Puerto Rican rug. Eggs were thrown all over the kitchen.

The freezer in the basement had been opened and several sacks of frozen blackberries were opened and strewn all over the basement. The culprits wiped their hands on a set of new silk curtains hanging in the basement.

The upstairs was ransacked, all the dresser drawers opened and the clothing thrown over the rooms. Police said that \$1.00 in coins had been taken from a coin purse in an upstairs bedroom, but that \$2000 in already endorsed checks, cameras, and valuable sterling silver was left untouched. Police thought that it was the job of more than one person.
