Fur Styles Shown In Special Display

A two-day showing of fine furs at the Bu-tik, sponsored by Rudolph's of Eugene, brought Sam Morse of the Fur Designer's Guild to Eugene, Friday and Saturday. The exhibit will be repeated in September, under the same arrangement, the date to be announced later.

Most popular furs of this year, according to Morse, are baby seal, which is especially suitable to wet climates, kolinsky, China mink, squirrel and Persian lamb. Muskrat has returned to popular demand, since the price has dropped.

All furs are approximately thirty per cent less this year than last, the designer stated. A tax still is charged, as a luxury item.

Dress furs include Russian mink, ermine, kolinsky and Persian lamb. Suitable for sports wear are leopard, kidskin, beaver, ombre muskrat, and fitch.

Styles include coats in all lengths, from 32 to 46 inches, the one a shorty or cape, the other extreme the full-length coat used for evening. Popular lengths are mostly from 36 to 40 inches, for casual use.

Coats have tapered shoulders, and cuffs are wider this year. Flares are a must—that is, the back of the coat must be full enough to ripple into three or four folds.
