

Lefty Joe Hatten Pitches Dodgers Into Tie

Yanks Increase American Lead

Relief Job in 2nd After Winning First

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Lefty Joe Hatten, a freckled-faced lefty with an Indian sign on the Reds, drew the hero's plaudits Monday as the Brooklyn Dodgers pulled up dead even with St. Louis Cardinals atop the National League.

Hatten hurled the Dodgers to a seven-hit 7 to 0 victory over Cincinnati in the first game of a doubleheader Sunday, and then came back as a reliever in the second game to save it for a 2 to 1 triumph. Since the Cards played only one game—they won it, 9 to 2, over the Giants—the Dodgers made up their week-old half game deficit and went into the tie for first place, each team with 63 games won and 39 lost for the season.

The Braves finally broke their losing streak at five games by lambasting the Cubs, 11 to 0, in the first game of a doubleheader, but they lost the second in 10 innings, 4 to 3.

Dick Sisler pinch-hit a home run with two on base in the ninth inning of the nightcap to give the Phillies a sweep of a twin bill against the Pirates, 7 to 3 and 5 to 4.

The New York Yankees stepped ahead a mile in the American League race by murdering the Browns, 20 to 2, in the first game of a doubleheader and then playing a 2-2 tie in the 10-inning nightcap before darkness halted the proceedings. Meanwhile, the second-place Indians lost two games to the Athletics, 5 to 4 and 4 to 2, while the Red Sox dropped a single contest to Detroit, 6 to 4.

The riotous 22-hit Yankee victory was costly, for Yogi Berra suffered a fractured thumb when hit by a pitched ball in the third inning and will be out for three weeks.

The latest Washington losing streak was ended at seven when the Senators beat the White Sox, 1 to 0, on an unearned run in the second game after the Sox took the opener, 4 to 1.

Elks Whack Junction 10-2 in Evergreen

ELKTON, August 8.—The Elkton Elks kept their faint pennant hopes for the Evergreen circuit baseball crown alive here Sunday as they blasted out a 10-2 win over Junction City.

Then Clingman was tagged and Small worked on him, nodding confidently to Lipscomb in the corner. Small had a full Nelson on Clingman when Piluso interrupted and Lipscomb promptly joined the melee.

When referee Georges Dusette regained control of the situation, Clingman had a toe hold on Small again and Lipscomb was in agony waiting outside the ropes to be tagged. Several tags ensued for the cleanies before the match ended with Piluso working on Small with a toe hold and Lipscomb beside himself with rage.

Quarter-Horse Racing Slated for Roseburg

ROSEBURG — Southern Oregon turf fans are slated for a new experience at Roseburg's 10-night racing meet of thoroughbreds and quarter horses, August 17-27. Douglas County's half-mile track at the fairgrounds will be the scene of Oregon's first major quarter horse racing under pari-mutuel wagering.

Nearly 300 thoroughbreds and quarter horses are expected to attend the meet. Adequate box stalls are being built so that all horses will be accommodated right in the stable area of the track. The track itself is being resurfaced and regraded, the grandstand is being remodeled for pari-mutuel betting, installation of an entire new lighting system for the night races is in progress, and photo finish equipment is being installed. 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Nevada's Beasley Slated for Handyman's Role with Yanks

CHESHIRE, Conn., Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—Scott Beasley, the end who made Nevada's passer Stan Heath an all-American halfback last year, is expected to make the professional football grade with the Brooklyn-New York Yankees in not one but five positions this year.

The Yankees tried to sign both ends of the Heath-Beasley aerial combination, but the Green Bay Packers came up with Heath. Somewhat disappointed at first because they didn't get Heath, the Yankees now believe it was just as well. Otherwise, they probably wouldn't have discovered Beasley's versatility.

In a task unparalleled in modern pro football, Beasley has been assigned jobs at end, tackle, guard, blocking back and place kicker.

A streamlined 210-pounder, the 25-year-old Beasley, a native of Sullivan, Ind., is confident he

can fill the bill in all capacities for the Yankees.

The Yankees will carry only six ends on their 32-man squad, and with such top stars as Dick Rifenburg of Michigan, Veteran Barney Poole of Mississippi and Dan Garza of Oregon, it became quite apparent that Beasley would not become a first string wingman, despite his adeptness at pass catching and rockwall defense.

"I'm thinking very seriously of playing Beasley considerably at both tackle and guard," said Head Coach Red Strader, who is installing the T-formation for the first time in the Yankees.

"He's faster than anybody we've got in either position and he has showed in practice that he can take over if we need him."

Beasley's speed may earn him several assignments as blocking back, too. The Yankees are ad-

mitedly weak in that department, mainly because none of their guys can keep up with the fleet Halfback Buddy Young. Beasley isn't asked to outstrip Young, either, but Strader feels he can stay with him long enough to mow down some of the opposition.

The kicking assignment resulted from Beasley's "greatest football thrill." He booted a 37-yard field goal while attending Sullivan High School that gave his team the district championship. With Harvey Johnson the Yankees' only consistent place-kicker, Beasley is taking a crack at that, too.

Beasley denied he contributed much to Heath's brilliant record last year even though he caught 25 of Stan's passes for 389 yards.

"Stan will be a great pro passer," Beasley declared. "He'd be great on any field."

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
