CHICAGO, Aug. 13 — (AP)—Buck White's seven-under-par 65 Friday gave him a halfway total of 135 and the lead by a whisker in a bunch chase of par-busters sprinting for the \$10,000 first prize of the Tam O'Shanter world golf meet.

A pro for 30 years, White coupled his blistering 34-31-65 with an opening round 70 which left him nine under par. Despite this superb shooting, the Greenwood, Miss., veteran could boast only a one-stroke edge over Johnny Palmer of Badin, N. C., and only a two-stroke margin over four other money hounds clustered at 137.

White, who lost to Byron Nelson in a playoff for 1943 Tam honors, needed only 28 putts in fashioning his 65, lowest second round tally which was matched by defending Champion Lloyd Mangrum.

Palmer banged a 69 after starting with 67 to total 136. Palmer, fourth leading money winner of the season and runner-up for the 1949 national P.G.A. title, dropped in a 10-foot birdie putt on the last hole to gain second place. Deadlocked in third with 137 were Clayton Heafner of Charlotte, N. C., with a 71 after a Ransom of Chicago with 70, Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., 68 and Jim Turnesa of Briarcliff, N. Y., 69.

Grouped at 138 were Ed Furgol, Royal Oaks, Mich., with a 70 Friday, Bob Hamilton, Landover, Md., 35-31-66; and Sam Snead who tops the financial list with \$25,893, with a rallying pair of 33's for 66. Snead was far behind in the par-busting jubilee after a standard 72 Thursday.
