

Hoover Report in the Black

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The Hoover Commission is "in the black," the committee for reorganization reported in its monthly report, "Reorganization News."

The committee's arithmetic works this way: The government of former President Herbert Hoover's report to the government of the military unification bill, passed last week, will bring a saving of \$1 billion to the armed services, it is estimated. The general services bill, passed June 30, should trim at least \$1 billion more from government housekeeping budgets.

Women Douse Dust Blaze

Firemen were called to a sawdust fire on First street between Lincoln and Lawrence streets at 4:16 a.m. Saturday. The fire, owned by the Heating Co., was not extinguished by the blaze.

The citizens committee also charged that bureaucrats are "thundering" their opposition to Hoover recommendations for government reorganization except where it increases their salaries and their staffs.

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There also is strong opposition to plan No. 2, which would transfer the U. S. Employment Service and the Bureau of Employment Security from the Federal Security Agency to the Labor Department.

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Unique Scout Unit Formed In Nevada

RENO, Nevada—Paralyzed and crippled youngsters can now be Boy Scouts. Scout Troop 110, of Reno, the only unit of its kind in the world, is made up entirely of boys who can't take part in normal activities.

George Houx, who lost his right arm in an accident a month ago, and the Forbush twins, Ronald and Donald, who have had rheumatic fever, are typical members.

Learning to Write
George is being taught to write with his left hand, and the twins are learning handicrafts they can follow without exertion. All activities of the unit are checked with individual family doctors for approval.

Men and women counselors have been trained by the Area Council and visit each of the boys once a week.

Rules Modified
Normal scouting rules have been modified so that members can obtain regular awards. After a monthly court of honor a counselor visits each boy who has earned an award and presents it to him in his home or hospital room.

Special permission from Scout headquarters had to be obtained for the unit. Its charter permits boys who recover to go on to normal scouting to retain their awards.

Radio sets, model airplanes, scrap-books, and stamp collections are made by the shut-ins.

BLM Sets Market Quota For Timber Cut Next Year

Under a new procedure covering timber sales, the Bureau of Land Management has announced that the quota to be placed on the market during 1950 has been placed at 405,000,000 board feet.

This includes primarily O & C timber, but a limited amount of public domain timber may be included in case applications for purchase are made.

The revised plan calls for the establishment of an advanced timber sales program on a calendar year basis.

Individuals interested in the purchase of any timber have until Aug. 15, Monday, to make requests of the bureau, indicating the timber desired and the time of the year operations are expected to start.

Application forms, when filled out, give an approximation of the timber by species and the point where the logs will be processed. A map must also be included showing the location of the land, existing and proposed roads and the rights of the applicant to the roads.

The final sales plan for 1950 will be announced by Dec. 15 of this year, and the sales will

be conducted at two-month intervals beginning next February. The customary advertising procedure will be followed.

The next maximum amount of timber that will be sold in any one of the 12 master sustained yield units in Oregon is as follows:

Columbia River, 6,000,000 board feet; Clackamas-Molalla, 7,500,000 board feet; Santiam River, 18,500,000 board feet; Alsea-Rickreall, 24,000,000 board feet; Douglas, 50,000,000 board feet; South Umpqua, 20,000,000 board feet; Upper Willamette, 39,500,000 board feet; Siuslaw River, 43,500,000 board feet; South Coast, 95,000,000 board feet; Jackson, 54,500,000 board feet; Josephine, 31,500,000 board feet; Klamath, 15,000,000 board feet.

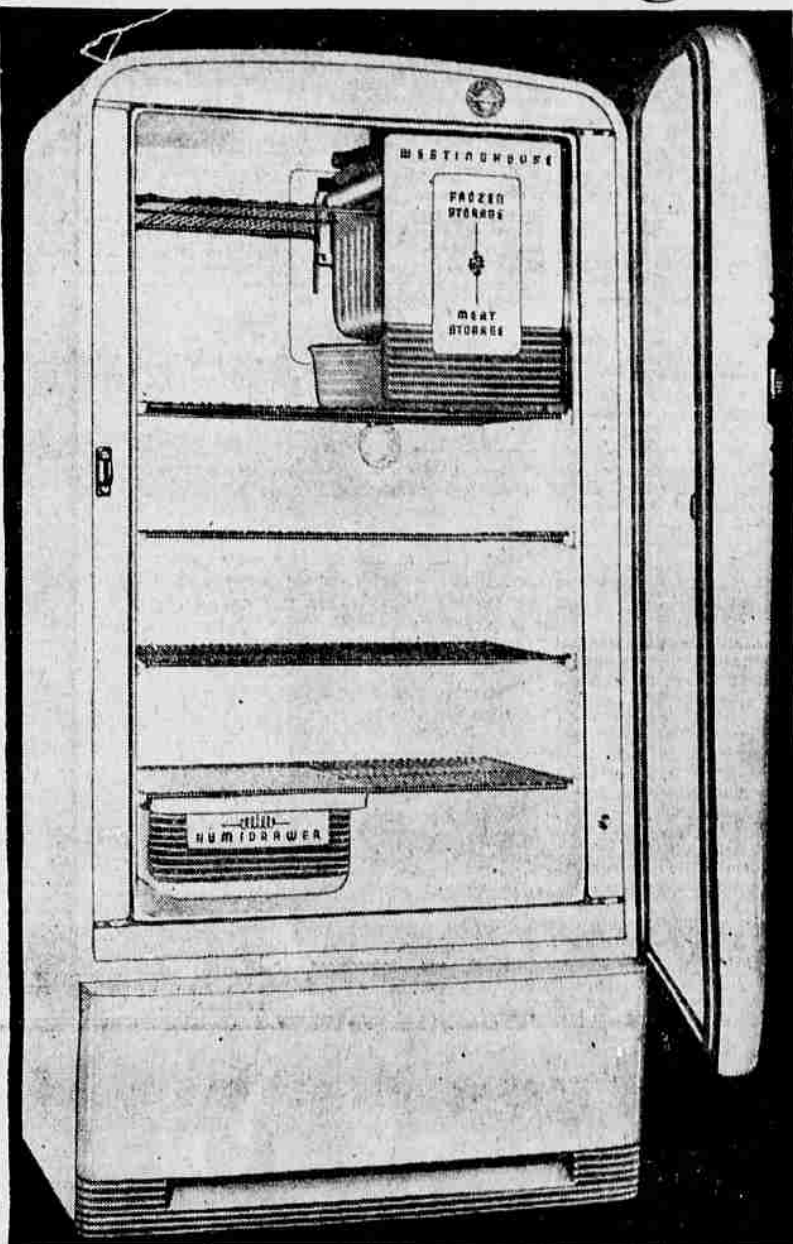
HORSE IN A HURRY

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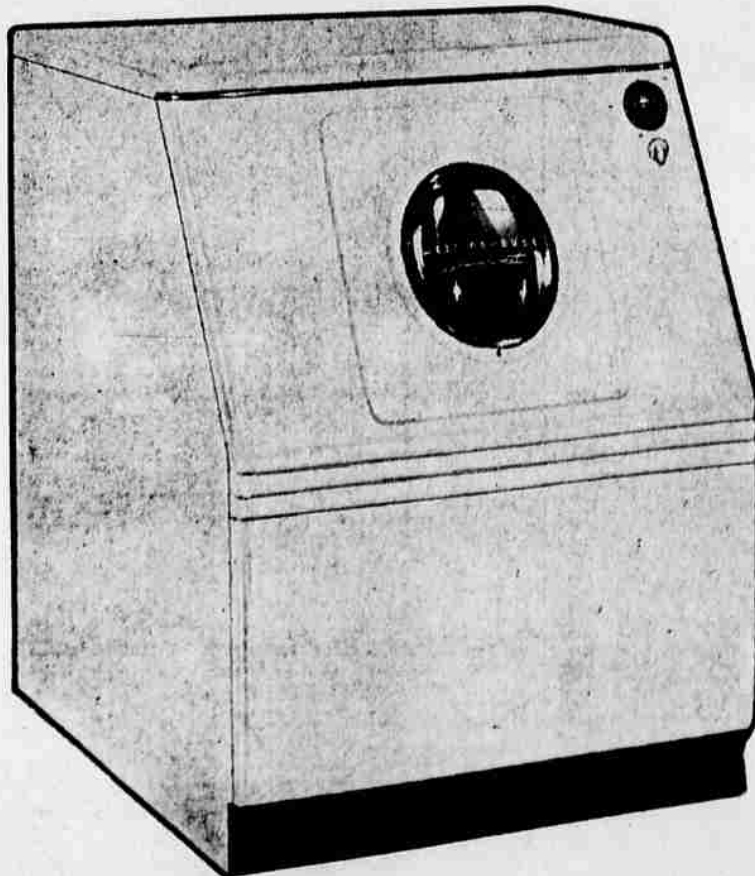

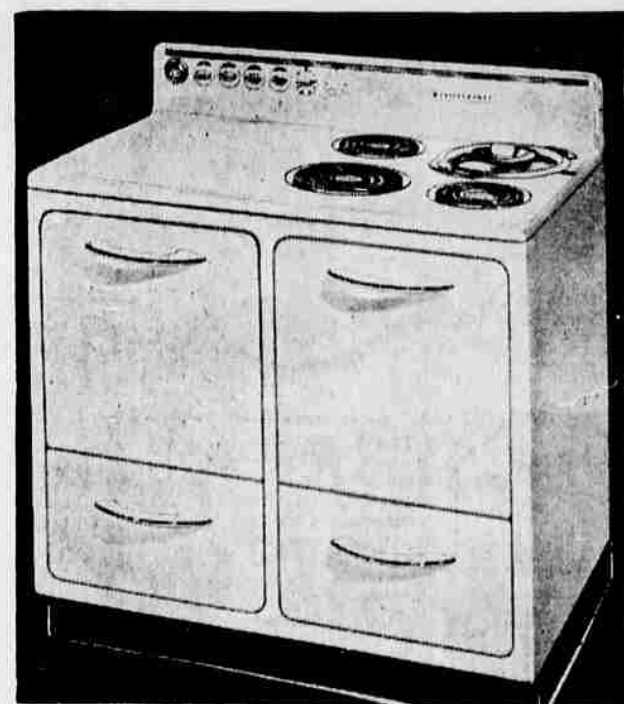
