

Commies Use Polish Vessels 'Slipping' Agents Into U. S.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Chairman of the Senate subcommittee on immigration, Joseph P. McCarran (D-Nev.), said today that about 225 Communist agents had slipped into the United States since 1947 aboard Polish vessels.

McCarran said the agents were "slipping" into the country by means of Polish vessels, and that they were being used to conduct subversive activities.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Soft coal operators said Saturday the government will bankrupt them if Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder rules their contributions to the United Mine Workers welfare and retirement fund subject to federal taxes.

But they said they don't think he will.

This possibility was one of the main worries of the operators as they decided to bow indefinitely to the decision of UMW Chief John L. Lewis to impose a three-day work week on the industry east of the Mississippi River.

The operators, at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., where they have been negotiating with UMW for a new contract, voted Friday against closing their mines for an
