

Patient Husband Waits For Wife

CAMBRIDGE, England — (UP) — Norman Morrow-Tait, who has been baby-sitting for a year while his young wife flew around the world with his best friend, says he plans to greet her with orchids when she returns home.

His flame-haired wife, an ex-artists model, is expected to arrive here from Iceland Thursday, the anniversary of her takeoff. If she makes it, she will be the first woman to fly around the world in a light plane. She will fly from Greenland to Iceland and thence to England.

"Wherever she decides to land, whether it be Croydon (London) or Cambridge, I shall be there with a sheaf of orchids," her patient husband said.

Mrs. Morrow-Tait, 24, who had only 100 hours of solo flying before she set out to fly around the world, had expected to make the trip in six weeks, but she was beset by troubles. She crash-landed in Marseille, France, and later spent several months in Canada having her plane repaired and awaiting clearance.

Morrow-Tait said his two-year-old daughter Anna, "as bonny a child as a mother could wish to greet after a year's absence, will be with me at the airport."

He said his mother had helped him care for his daughter during his wife's absence.

When Mrs. Morrow-Tait, who took off from here on Aug. 18, 1948, in her single-engine Proctor plane, she was accompanied by her navigator, Michael Townsend, a 25-year-old bachelor and former geography student at Cambridge.

Morrow-Tait said Townsend "is a fine chap and my greatest friend."

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Senator George Urges Tax Cut

WASHINGTON — (UP) — Sen. Walter F. George, (D-Ga.), top-ranking Senate tax spokesman, Sunday called for an "immediate" reduction in taxes to stimulate business and expand the nation's economy.

He proposed a six-point reduction program, including special deductions for earned income, dividends, "creative talent" groups and long-term research; new tax rules for businessmen who are paying off mortgages on their equipment; and elimination or reduction in wartime excise rates.

In Radio Interview
George, chairman of the tax-writing Senate Finance Committee, offered his plan for a "constantly expanding economy" in a radio interview with commentator Charles Farmer, station WPIK, Alexandria, Va. He said that in a period of recession, the best way to meet the "legitimate" costs of government without running into the red is not to increase taxes but to lower them as a stimulus to more business activity.

Along with tax cuts, he said government spending must be "stripped of waste" at home and abroad, and foreign spending must be curbed.

George said "immediate tax reductions are indicated," he made the following suggestions:

1. "A tax credit should be given to the individual taxpayer on dividends" received from stock investments. He said a credit of 10 per cent, such as allowed by Canada, would cost the treasury about \$500,000,000 a year.

2. "Preferential treatment must be given for earned income, if we are to stimulate incentive to all ambitious young men and women."

3. "There must be special consideration for creative talent groups, including authors, professional men and women and others constituting these special groups."

4. "We should provide special deductions for long-term research."

5. "By realistic regulations, with amendments to the law if necessary, we must make better provision for business to amortize plant and equipment. The goal should be to provide modern, up-to-date tools, machines, plants and equipment every 10 years at least so the nation will always be ready for 'national emergencies such as war.'"

6. "The substantial reduction of the excise taxes or preferably the elimination of all war-time excises is imperative."

Former Priest Weds Divorcee

BUCKEYE, Ariz. — (UP) — A former Catholic priest and his twice-divorced bride left for a honeymoon "up and down the Pacific Coast" following a well-attended civil marriage ceremony here.

The couple were united Sunday at the home of Ralph Watkins, ex-Shrine high potentate and Democratic committeeman. More than 700 persons attended the affair and feted the bride and groom, Emmett McLoughlin and stenographer Mary Davis McGovern Manoli, 34.

McLoughlin resigned from the priesthood last year in protest against orders to leave his work as superintendent of St. Monica's Hospital, Phoenix.

As a priest, he founded "Father Emmett's Clinic" to care for underprivileged persons from Phoenix's south side and pioneered in a revolutionary anti-scorpion bite serum which he openly smuggled from Mexico.

Mrs. McLoughlin is a former University of Arizona student and hospital employee. She now operates a private medical stenographer service.

Judge Charles Bernstein performed the ceremony, attended by persons from all races and creeds. More than 150 doctors and the former governor of Arizona, Bob Jones, were numbered among the many guests.

Flower Rites Honor Lost Fisherfolk

GLOUCESTER, Mass. — (UP) — Gloucester fisherfolk set flowers adrift on the ocean Sunday to honor 10,000 comrades lost at sea in the past 300 years. But for the first time in the 58-year-history of the ceremony, not a single new name was added to the "roll of missing dead."

The ebb tide slowly carried the floral wreaths out to the North Atlantic graves of missing Gloucester men after ministers of four religious faiths gave thanks to God that since last August no one from the historic seaport has been reported "missing at sea."

Some 3000 persons watched as Chaplain Orin Dice of the Fishermen's Institute walked from the familiar fisherman's statue to Blynman Bridge and then repeated these lines:

"In memory of all our sons through all the years who have found their last resting place in the waters which wash every shore, we lovingly strew these flowers."

Economy Talks Set By Britons

LONDON — (UP) — British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir Stafford Cripps will return to London within the next two weeks to prepare for the most critical conference for Britain since the war ended, informed sources said Monday.

The conference will take place in Washington next month when the British, Americans and Canadians meet to try to find a solution to the world dollar crisis which is slowly driving Britain to bankruptcy.

The Society at present is working to provide an animal shelter for protecting all stray animals.

Former Premier Flies to Tokyo

SAN FRANCISCO — (UP) — Former Japanese Premier Tetsu Katayama left here aboard a Pan American Clipper for Tokyo on the last leg of his return from a visit to Europe.

Katayama, chairman of the Social Democratic Party and Japan's first Christian premier, was on his way home from Caux, Switzerland, where he attended the assembly on moral rearmament. He also visited Germany, France and England.

His plane departed from here at 11 a.m., PST.

War Espionage Cases Revealed

WASHINGTON — (UP) — The House Un-American Activities Committee says there were two wartime "attempts" and "one positive case" of Communist espionage at the Berkeley, Calif., atomic research center.

The committee said the attempts were made through a "Communist cell," consisting of scientists working at the University of California radiation laboratory.

The committee's statement was made in a foreword to a transcript of hearing in the cases. The foreword did not outline the details of the two "attempts to obstruct" the development of the Soviet government. But it explained that the "one positive case" involved the "Scientist X" affair.

The story of Scientist X, whose name has never been revealed, was first told by the committee in a report last fall. He was then described as a technician who worked at the Berkeley laboratory during the war.

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North Santiam Route Opens

DETROIT — (UP) — The new North Santiam Highway, linking the Willamette and Deschutes Valleys, is open.

The completion of the route, dedicated in formal ceremonies Sunday, will make possible full-scale work on the \$28 million Detroit Dam.

The guests at the dedication ranged from Gov. Douglas McKay to 94-year-old C. T. Hennessy, who crossed the Santiam Pass with his parents in 1864.

Crash Outs Fuses Near Silverton

SILVERTON — (UP) — Electric service from Silverton to Silver Creek Falls was disrupted Sunday after an auto struck a telephone pole. The jolt caused fuses to burn out in the area.

Silverton police said Henry Volk struck the pole while driving on the Salem-Silverton highway just outside the Silverton city limits. The impact mixed two high-voltage currents and caused the fuse blowout.

Catholics Consecrate Two Czech Bishops

TRNAVA, Czechoslovakia — The Roman Catholic Church Sunday consecrated two new bishops.

The government ordered such ceremonies unless government approval is obtained. Also prohibited pilgrimages and ceremonies. A large crowd, however, despite government transport blockades, gathered for the ceremonies.

FOOD LOCKERS BURST

PORTLAND — (UP) — A destroyed part of the 10th and Froese Food Lockers, an estimated \$25,000 damage, was destroyed Sunday.

Not much of the food in the lockers was hurt, however, and the unit and meat were destroyed.

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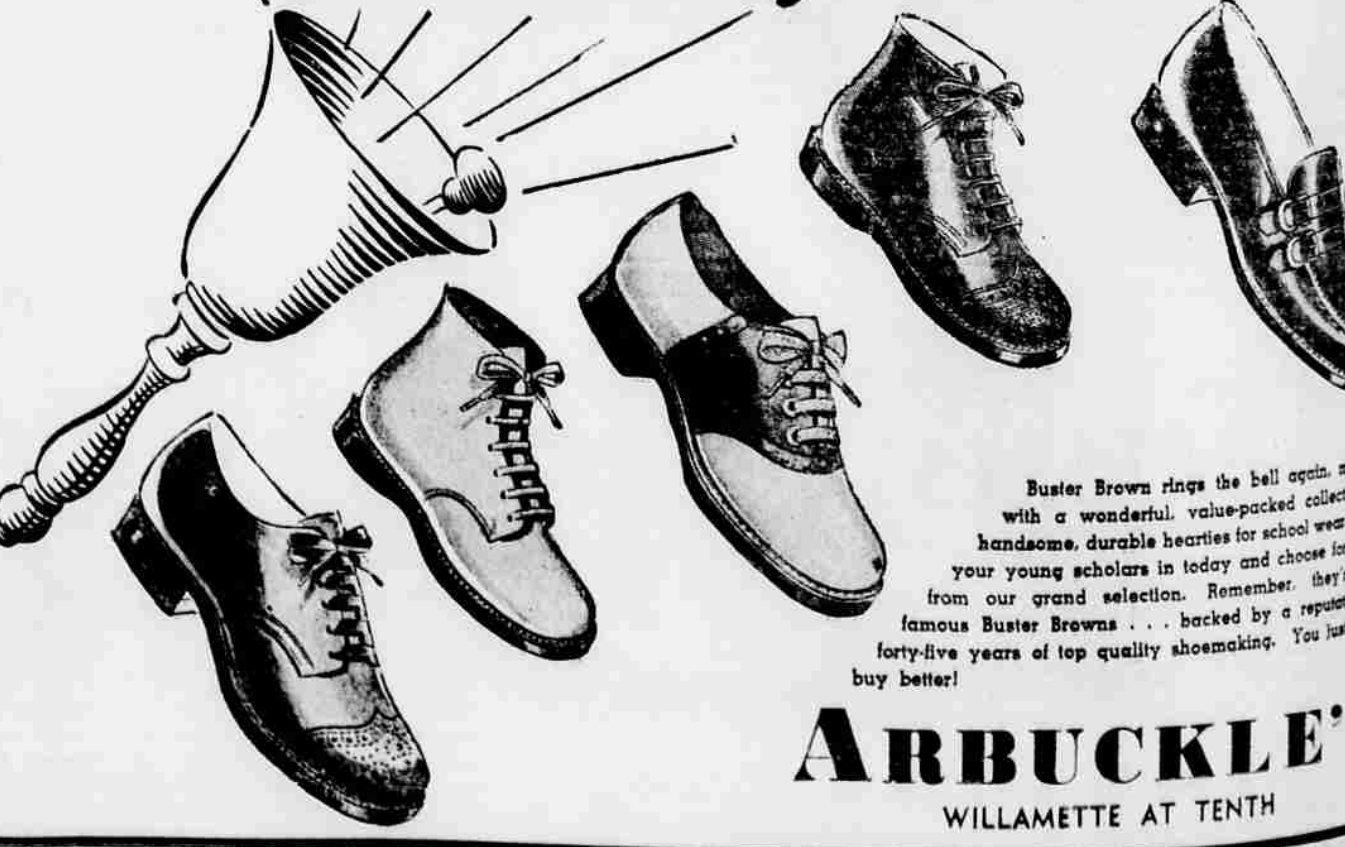
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
