### Palmer, Demaret End Tam Session in Tie

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Jimmy Demaret, a song-singing veteran from Ojai, Cal., and Johnny Palmer, a pleasant plugger from Badin, N.C., took different routes around Tam O'Shanter course Sunday, but ended in a tie for first place in the "world championship" of golf with 72 holes scores of 275.

They were to play it off Monday. Demaret, long one of the game's greatest stars, blistered the links for a final round 67, five under par, for his total, while Palmer, most consistent of the 32 players in the final two rounds, scored a two under par 70, for his poorest round of the tournament.

It was a gift from Palmer to Demaret that set up the tie and an 18-hole playoff between the two. Johnny, a 31-year-old veteran of 30 missions over Tokyo as a B-29 waist gunner, bobbled his second shot on the final green and lost the stroke which brought on the deadlock.

With his ball off to the left of the green, he chipped up short and missed the putt to bogie the hole. Until then Palmer looked like a sure winner.

He was never far off the pace during the "world" event, with a first round 67, then a 69, and a third round 69 which left him tied with Buck White, Greenwood, Miss., for the lead.

Sunday they paired White and Palmer for the final round and Johnny moved out in a hurry. He birdied the hole of the first three holes and finished one under par for the first nine while White, never winner of a major tourney, went two over par to plunge right out of contention.

But meanwhile Demaret, ever a threat in any golf tourney, went out early before the bulk of the estimated crowd of 20,000 arrived, and he pulled around fully all the way about to come home for a 72 hole total thirteen strokes under par.

After he finished there were only two players with a chance, Palmer and Slamming Sam Snead, who had begun the round Sunday one stroke behind Palmer and White.

Snead started fast to look like the probable winner, but his accustomed putting woes assailed him before he finished the first nine and he turned one stroke under par, still trailing Palmer. After that his putter was even worse and with two bogies in the next five holes, he lost all chance to tie.

Still Slammin' Sam finished third with a 71 for a total of 277, and that gave him a prize of \$5000 and increased his earnings for the year to \$20,893.83. Cary Middlecoff, Memphis, tied for fourth with Toney Penna, Cincinnati, at 278, good for \$2500 each. Hamilton, Landover, Md., had a 71 for fifth place and \$1500. White, who had a 75, took sixth money of \$1200 with a 280 total.

# Onrushing Red Sox Only Four Games Off Pace

## Brooklyn Again National Head

Tribe Sweeps Pair With Chicago Nine

A penny for Casey Stengel's thoughts Monday as once again the manager of the New York Yankees feels the hot breath of the oncoming Boston Red Sox on the back of his neck.

Wasn't it just seven weeks ago that Stengel wrote off the Red Sox? "This is it," he exclaimed jubilantly on July after the Yankees had whipped the Sox for the fifth straight time. "The Red Sox won't bother us any more. We knocked them right out of the race. They'll never recover."

Trail by Four  
Monday, exactly seven weeks later, the Red Sox, in an amazing about face, have made up two thirds of the ground on the Yankees. Now in second place, they've picked up eight games and trail by only four. Oddly enough, there are exactly seven weeks left in the playing schedule. It doesn't make a certified public accountant to figure out the pennant winner, should the Sox repeat their last seven weeks' work.

The Sox, piling up 24 hits and 18 bases on balls, overpowered the Washington Senators twice Sunday, 9-3 and 13-4, to pick up another game on the Yankees. Stengel's crew whipped Philadelphia, 4-2, but the Athletics came back to win the second game of the doubleheader, 4-3.

The twin triumph gave the Red Sox a record of 32 victories in 41 at the moment. They've now won 18 of 22 in their latest home stand. Five in a row have come at the expense of the Senators, whom they meet 10 more times. In one, they hold an 8-3 lead after six innings. The game will be completed later this week.

Boston also has seven games left with the Yankees. The Brooklyn Dodgers regained the lead from St. Louis, in the tight National League race, winning from Boston, 7-2, while Pittsburgh was trouncing the Cardinals, 4-0. This turn of events put the Brooks one game in front of the Redbirds.

The third place New York Giants remained 12 full games off the pace despite their two victories over the Philadelphia Phils, 8-1 and 1-0. The Cincinnati Reds came out on top in the battle of the cellarites, winning two from the last place Chicago Cubs, 4-2 and 8-0.

Lefty Mel Parnell turned in his 18th triumph for the Boston Red Sox with a seven-hitter in the opener against Washington. Dom DiMaggio sparked the Red Sox attack with a home run in the second game with two mates on base to help Jack Kramer beat the Senators' Paul Calvert.

Advance with Wins  
The third place Cleveland Indians advanced to within five games of the top by winning both ends of a doubleheader from Chicago White Sox, 4-3 and 5-0. Bob Lemon hurled his 14th victory in the opener, and Garcia his 10th in the nightcap. It was the Mexican's third shutout.

The fourth place Detroit Tigers moved to within eight and a half games off the pace, downing the St. Louis Browns twice, 6-2 and 4-3. Fred Hutchinson coasted to his 11th victory and his sixth straight with a six-hitter in the opener. George Kell paced the Tigers with a double and triple to drive in three runs.

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# Yaqui Kid Tops Ross On Foul in Mat Setto

The Yaqui Kid was awarded the main event decision Saturday night at the Armory before 2,000 fans with a single fall and a foul, called when tough Tony Ross created a near-riot by attacking Yaqui Joe, the Kid's trainer, and turning on the kid with a barrage of foul blows.

While the Kid leaned over the ropes anxiously, Ross entered the ring and attacked him with a furious assault of blows to the head and stomach. Referee Jack Mitchell tried futilely to raise the prostrate Kid's hand in token of victory by foul but Ross kept hammering away in spite of his fans crowded angrily around the ringside and shouting their displeasure. One spectator reached through the ropes in an attempt to ward off Ross.

Then Ross went to the dressing room as the Kid lay still. Yaqui Joe finally revived him and the Kid ran around the ring as if in a daze, frantically looking for his opponent. Fans standing up at the ringside were yelling, "Go get 'im, Kid." Trainer Joe was grappling with him, trying to get him to leave the ring. Reluctantly, he finally put on his rainbow-colored Indian blanket and crawled through the ropes.

The semi-final matched two lightning-fast wrestlers in the persons of Buck Weaver, crafty veteran from Indiana, and

## Frankie Stojack, snewy Tacoma grappler.

Stojack committed the indiscretion of relaxing his guard for a single minute as the battle began and that's exactly how long it took Weaver to notch the first fall.

The Hoosier trickster turned his back for a moment and lunged backwards. In a split second, he had flipped Stojack over with his Hoosier neckbreaker to take the fall.

Stojack was continually alert from that moment on as he wrestled Weaver to a standstill. The two were pretty evenly matched as evidenced by the several instances when they had identical holds on each other at the same time.
