NEW YORK—(AP)—A family picket line—a man, his wife and their nine children—marched in front of the Hotel Statler in busy midtown New York Wednesday in an effort to win back his job as doorman.

Hundreds of passersby gathered at 33rd Street and Seventh Avenue to watch Henry Hickey and his family in their protest. The Statler was formerly the Pennsylvania Hotel.

The general manager of the hotel said Hickey was fired because of his ill-temper and because he mistreated a guest who failed to tip him. Hickey carried a sign saying he was "Fired without cause."

Mrs. Hickey pushed their youngest child, Robert, 14 months, in a baby carriage.

The other children in the picket line were Sandy, 2, John, 3, Margie, 5, Betty, 6, Henry, 8, Patrick, 9, Frankie, 11, and Dickie, 14.

They carried signs reading "What did my daddy do?" and "My daddy never did anything wrong" and "Statler, please give my daddy his job back."

Also on hand was Hickey's lawyer, Michael C. Gray.

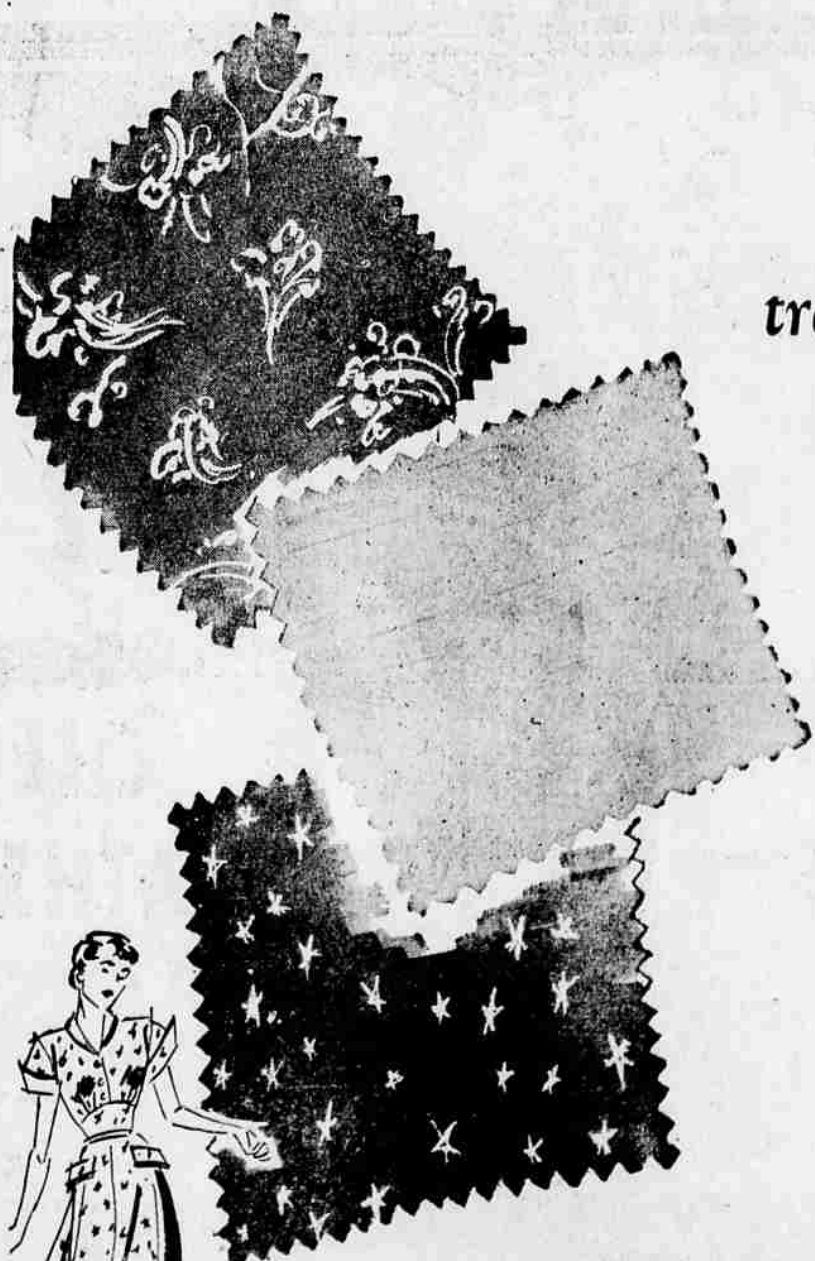
