BPA Sells Part Of Timber Plot

One clearing section timber sale on the Bonneville Power Administration's Breitenbush Power Line was sold Thursday by Willamette National Forest, and another section went without bids.

Sole bidder on 18,825,000 board feet in the Rapidan Section was Thompson-Hendrickson Logging Co. of Detroit which bid the appraised price of \$94,892.50.

This tract, 189 acres at Breitenbush Hot Springs, included 17,000,000 board feet Douglas fir at \$5.20; 350,000 feet cedar at \$3.35; 75,000 feet white pine at \$5.20 and 500,000 feet hemlock and other species at fifty cents.

There was no bidder on the Mt. Hood Section of the line, and sale is being held open by the Forest Service. The tract, 164 acres, 16 miles above Detroit, includes 11,300,000 board feet Douglas fir at \$6.60; 1,500,000 feet cedar at \$2.35; 70,000 feet white pine at \$6.60 and 2,400,000 feet hemlock and other species at fifty cents.

Total appraisal is \$79,187 on 15,270,000 board feet, with one mile of road to be built.

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Park Naming Up to Council

Recommendations that sprinkling systems be installed at six city park and playground areas and that four parks be given distinctive names will be made Monday night to the Eugene City Council.

These motions were drawn up Wednesday night at a meeting of the Eugene Recreation Commission also attended by members of the city council parks and recreation committee.

The commission proposes to use money from the \$28,000 capital improvement fund allowed in the bureau of parks and recreation budget to pay for the sprinkling system installations. They would improve recreational areas at 19th and Lawrence, 23rd and University, 15th and Fairmount, 10th and Grant, on the west side of Sladden Park and at the municipal swimming pool grounds.

The park renaming proposal was made after discussion of difficulties incurred in the period these areas have been designated only by street locations. One suggestion made at the Wednesday night meeting was that the 10th and Grant playground hereafter be called Grant Park; 15th and Fairmount, Fairmount Park; 20th and Washington, Washington Park; and 23rd and University, University Park.
