Circus 'War' Continues With Price Cuts

SEATTLE — (U.P.)—A summer-long circus "war" between the two biggest shows on the road has flared into new hostilities with Ringling fired back with a "paper war." In every city Cole played, it posted billboards screaming for circus-goers to "wait for the big show."

The advertisement read: "Don't be misled! The big show is here! 'Warning!' it said. 'This circus is the only really big circus that states its prices. Why 'wait' and pay up to \$3.00 to see the same old circus you saw last year when you can see the new history-making Cole Bros. circus for . . . 69 cents for adults, 42 cents for children (plus tax)."

Cole's press agent, Don Lang, said the new type of paper war had outmoded the oldtime skull-cracking hand-to-hand battles waged by shows in the old days. But this was more effective, he said.

"We've fought the Old Lady (Ringling) across the country," he said.

"It all boils down to a battle for free enterprise. We're not going to be gobbled up like Al G. Barnes, Sells-Floto, Barnum and Bailey, Hagenbeck-Wallace and the other shows of the 30's."

In fact, he said, Cole Bros. stands a chance to replace Ringling in Madison Square Garden's one of these days.

Ned Irish, executive vice-president of the Garden, was among the fans at the Cole performance at Denver earlier this month and chose the next day to announce there that an eight-year contract with Ringling expires next year.

At the same time, he commented that Cole Bros. was a "real big league show."

TUNNEL SETS TILING RECORD
NEW YORK.—(U.P.)—The longest continuous strip of tile ever laid in the United States is being installed in the Brooklyn-Battery tunnel, New York's \$80,000,000 answer to the problem of easing traffic between Manhattan and Brooklyn. The tunnel lining will require more than 780,000 square feet of clay tile, or enough for 6,500 average size bathrooms. It will extend 9,117 feet.

(Celia Lee Tested Recipe)

Sift together into bowl:
3 cups Crown Best Patent Flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup sugar

Add:
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup melted shortening

Beat to a smooth, heavy batter. Spread in a greased baking pan. Cover with sliced fresh peaches and top with the following mixture:
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Bake in a moderate oven (375°) about 40 minutes. Serve with cream or any desired sauce.
