# Aiken Asks 48 Ducks To Report Aug. 29

Forty-eight gridmen, including 19 lettermen and seven junior college transfers, have been invited to report to fall football practice at the University of Oregon by Head Coach Jim Aiken. The opening session will be August 29, and Aiken has instructed the candidates to report in condition—ready for scrimmage.

Also included in the select 48, which will likely be increased to 60 or 70 by unexpected newcomers, will be ten non-lettermen holdovers, ten up from last year's Frosh squad, and two without experience—Dick Daugherty, 207-pound center, and Dean Hanson, 212-pound tackle.

The squad will include six 1948 offense regulars—Guard Ted Meland, Guard Ed Chrobot, Steve Dotur, Halfback Woody Lewis, Halfback George Ball, and Fullback Bob Sanders, and four other regulars on defense, namely, Tackle Bob Roberts, Guard Chester Daniels, Quarterback Earl Stille, and Fullback DeWayne Johnson. Also included is halfback Johnny McKay, leading scorer and alternate left-halfback with Lewis.

Most prominent among the junior college transfers is Bill Fell, fleet-footed halfback from Compton, along with a fast-stepping runningmate, Jack Giblisco. Outstanding sophomores are expected to be Quarterback Jim Calderwood, Halfback Chuck Missfeldt, and Guard Jerry Moscholsky.

There will be two additions to the coaching staff, too, Jerry Lillie, from Willamette, as backfield coach, and Bob McClure, from the Boston Yankees in pro ball, as a line assistant. Holdovers on the staff are Bob Sullivan, line, and Bill Bowerman, freshmen.

Daily doubles are expected for the two weeks in which the Webfoots have to prepare for their opener against St. Mary's College at Kezar Stadium, San Francisco, the night of September 16.

Aiken will be faced with the problem of replacing 11 lettermen, including Quarterback Norm Van Brocklin, Ends Dan Garza and Dick Wilkins, Guard Jim Berwick, Center Brad Ecklund, and Tackle Don Stanton. Other players included on the select list follow: Ends—Darrell Robinson, \*Les

There have been 56 requests for the Iowa game at Iowa City October 28.
