The wiry, sun-tanned ex-British soldier left Tranquille, B. C., Aug. 2, on the start of an adventure that was a dream he shared with other prisoners of war when they worked in the paddy fields of Siam.

Winter was one of the 80,000 soldiers captured by the Japanese at Singapore in February 1942. "We used to talk nights about what we'd do if we ever lived through the war," he said. "I had this notion of cycling through the United States and Mexico."

He came to Canada last year and worked long enough to finance his proposed trip.

Now he's off on a tour that he expects to complete in seven months. He's not sure, though, because he hasn't made detailed plans. "I don't want it cut and dried," he explained. "That takes all the adventure out of traveling."

Winter says however, he wants to see the Redwoods and the Painted Desert before his 3-months U. S. visa runs out. Winter can average 60 or 70 miles a day on his bicycle, a three-speed, light British model. He camps out nights, with the equipment he's carrying.

His first impression of the United States was rather frightening, he admitted Thursday. "I came across the border into Washington," he related, "and started encountering all your huge auto freighters. Loaded-down like I was, and with narrow tires on my cycle, I couldn't go on the gravel on the roadside without skidding. And those big trucks bear down on you! I thought my trip was going to end right there in Washington."

Winter found the traffic better in Oregon. "He doesn't mind the Pacific Coast mountains. They aren't too bad, climbing with a gear-shift bicycle, he says, and 'after you've attained the top, coasting down the other side is the next thing to flying."

Winter thinks cycling would be more popular in this country if people used the kind of bicycle he has, with gear-shift and racing-style tires.

A basket and towel system complete with a new washer and dryer has been installed at the school this summer. The high school rooms and the basement hall have been repainted.

Joe H. Stewart again is superintendent of the system and teaches high school sciences. His assistants are Miss Minnie Kjelde, English, library, and commercial subjects; Mrs. Elizabeth Elbon, high and junior high music and home economics; Miss Eleanor Edwards, girls' physical education and high school social science; Jack Mitchell, mathematics, physical education, and boys' athletic coach; and Rodney Wagner, band.

Miss Edwards, new on the faculty this year, is a graduate of the Bourne-Boston School of Physical Education affiliated with Tufts College, Medford, Mass. For the past two years she has taught physical education in the public schools in Foxboro, Mass., teaching in all 12 grades.

Wagner, also a new staff member, is attending the University of Oregon School of Music and will teach band on a part-time basis.

All former members of the grade school teaching staff are returning. They are Mrs. Elms Brockway, eighth grade; Richard Petersen, seventh grade and high school shop; Mrs. Florence Piper, sixth grade; Miss Alma Sturtz, fifth grade; Mrs. Evelyn Cox, fourth grade; Mrs. Olle Johnson, third grade and grade music; Mrs. Erna Schewepe, second grade; and Mrs. Mildred Gibson, first grade.

Parents are reminded that first and ninth graders and all students attending Oregon schools for the first time must have physical examinations before entering school.
